SMALL SURPLUS.

Annual Meeting of Local
Agricultural Society.

The annual meeting of the Agricultural Society, No. 34, was held in the city council chamber at three o'clock this afternoon, with the president, John A. Campbell, M. P. P., of Kingsclear, in the chair, and a large number of the members in attendance.

Mr. D. Lee Babbitt, treasurer of the society, submitted a report on the finances for the past year. The receipts from the exhibition, including government and city grants, amounted to \$16,484.76 and the ordinary receipts such as membership fees, annual government grant, etc., amounted to \$1,372.04, which brings the total up to \$17,856.80. The expenditure amounted to \$17,795.21 and was classified as follows:

As will be seen from the above, the total amount expended on the buildings exceeds by \$352.54, the local government and city grants combined, and in addition \$1670.22 was expended on an electric light plant and \$660.85 on the grounds.

Mr. McCreedy in submitting his report announced that there was a balance in the Peoples Bank of \$59.59, which was

more than sufficient to meet all outstanding liabilities.

Secretary Hooper made a brief report on the recent exhibition, and announced that the society now owned property to the value of \$17,372.76, and it was not encumbered to the extent of one dollar.

A MULTI-MILLIONAIRE

Great Good Fortune of a Guelph Lawyer.

Guelph, Ont. Nov. 28.—Frank Hall, barrister of this city, left here today for England, where he has fallen heir to a fortune that will make him a millionaire many times over.

He goes to take possession of an estate of 8,000 acres in Nottingham, England. On it is famous Sherwood forest, where romance says Robin Hood made his headquarters. The estate yields a yearly revenue of \$375,000 and the only condition imposed on the heir is that he must reside there at least six months of each year.

Frank Hall's brother, Dr. A. W. Hall, also a former Guelph man, was the owner until his death on Oct. 14 last. It was left to him by his uncle, Captain Hall, 7th Hussars, who died in 1888. The uncle sent for both brothers some time previous to his death, but took a fancy to the doctor, and made him his heir. The present heir, however, is still a young man.

MANY LIVES LOST.

In the Storms Along European Coasts.

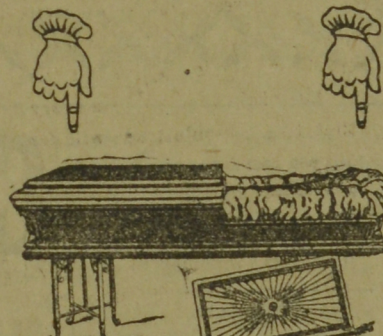
