SMALLPOX AT NASHWAAKSIS.

Daniel Green Down with the Disease Which He Contracted in Quebec Lumber Woods.

Considerable excitement has been created at Nashwaaksis, three miles from the city, over a case of smallpox which has developed there. The victim is Daniel Green, who has been working in the Quebec lumber woods, and returned home about a week ago on account of illness. Dr. Harry McNally of this city, was called to attend the patient, and pronounced his illness to be due to chicken pox, and so informed Dr. Mullin, chairman of the county board of health. The latter having been subjected to a great deal of adverse criticism in the past because of his alleged eagerness to establish quarantine in suspected smallpox cases and put the county authorities to expense, decided to let others take the initiative in this case. It appears that some of Green's neighbors, especially Conn. McFarlane, who has hitherto been quite a staunch believer in the chicken-pox theory, were not satisfied with Dr. McNally's diagnosis, and on Saturday evening had Dr. Weaver of this city called in upon the case. The doctor drove to Nashwaaksis, examined the patient and at once expressed the opinion that he was suffering from smallpox. He reported the matter to Dr. Mullin, who this morning went to Nashwaaksis and had the house placed in quarantine. He first satisfied himself, however, that the patient was suffering from smallpox, and pronounced it to be of rather a bad type.

Mr. Green is a man in the neighborhood of fifty years of age, and has a wife and family of children. All the members of the family have been vaccinated.

Died in the West.

Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar P. Slipp, who a few months ago removed from Kingsclear to Brainard, Minn., will regret to learn of the death of their youngest child, Paul, which occurred on the night of Saturday, Nov. 14th. The little fellow was troubled by an affliction of the windpipe and prior to his removal to the west underwent an operation at the Victoria Hospital and was afterwards treated by a specialist in Montreal. His condition improved considerably after reaching Brainard, and his parents looked for his complete recovery. On the night of his death, he was seized with a fit of coughing soon after retiring, and in less than an hour was dead. He was five years of age, and an unusually bright and loveable child, the idol of his parents. The greatest sympathy will be felt for them by their many friends in this locality.

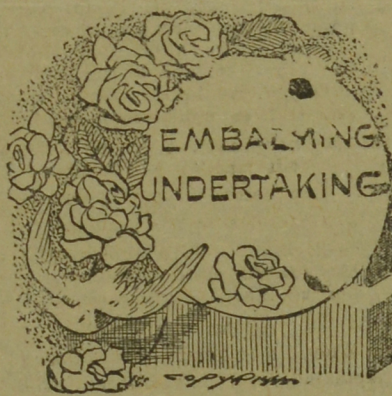
