

NO CHOICE YET.

Cardinals Took a Ballot for New Pope.

BUT NO CANDIDATE HAD NECESSARY MAJORITY.

Greatest Conclave in History of the Church.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Rome, Aug. 1.—The first vote of the cardinals in conclave today did not result in the election of a new Pope. Another vote will be taken this afternoon.

The cardinals awoke early this morning to attend to the solemn business before them. Cardinal Oreglia celebrated mass and afterwards administered communion to all the cardinals. After this each cardinal celebrated another mass, either at an altar in the ducale or in his own room. Breakfast followed, consisting of coffee and rolls. Then the great business of the day was at hand. At ten o'clock all the cardinals assembled in the Sistine chapel for the first ballot.

Rome, August 1.—The largest conclave in the history of the Roman Catholic church has now assembled in the Sistine chapel for the purpose of electing a successor to Leo XIII. Sixty-two cardinals with over 200 clerical and lay attendants, are, to all intents and purposes prisoners within the Vatican. One of them, Cardinal Herrarory Espinoza, Archbishop of Valencia, was prostrated immediately after entering the conclave and lies ill in his cell. This morning the cardinals entered upon the solemn duty of choosing the new pope by ballot. The general impression exists that within two or three days, possibly, though not probably today, a new pope will have been chosen.

Prognostications as to who will wear the tiara as Leo's successor have little value, as even the cardinals, who last evening entered their cells, seemed to be without definite ideas as to the issue. Cardinals Rampolla, Serafino, Vannutelli, Di Pietro, Gotti and Oreglia continue to be most frequently mentioned as the likeliest candidates.

The impression prevails in certain sections that no matter what the verdict of the conclave may be, great changes are impending in the policy of the Vatican, and that within a year or two the new pope will no longer consider himself a prisoner in the Vatican, but will unlike Leo, leave its precincts whenever necessary.

When the train reached here all the windows were shot out. The attempt was unsuccessful.

The negroes were supposed to be men who shot and seriously wounded a brakeman of an excursion train a few days ago.

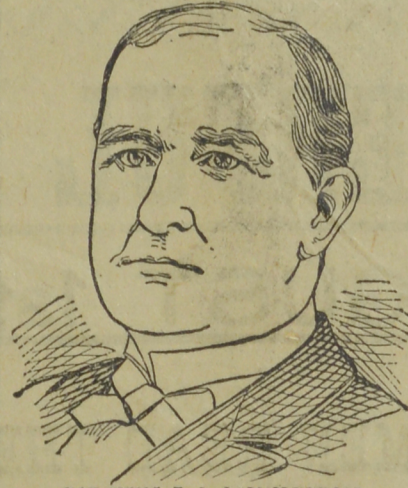

Portland, Oregon, August 1.—A span of the bridge which spans the Willamette river at Morrison street collapsed yesterday, precipitating more than one hundred people forty feet into the water. Three people are known to have been drowned, and it is feared that the list of dead will be very much larger when all are accounted for. Many fell on two small boat houses moored to a pier of the bridge, immediately under the spot where it gave way. About 25 were injured either by striking on the boat houses or by falling timbers. Many fell from the roofs of the boat houses into the water, but dozens of small boats and launches in the vicinity quickly commenced to pick them up.
