Dear Sir,—We beg to submit our report of the matriculation and leaving examinations for July, 1903. Ninety-two candidates took the matriculation and six the leaving examination. Of the ninety-two matriculation candidates, seven passed in the first division, thirty-seven in the second, twenty-one in the third, sixteen in the third conditionally and seven failed. Of the engineering candidates for matriculation there were four, and two passed in the second division, and two in the third conditionally. Of the six candidates who took the leaving examination three passed in the second division and three in the third.

MINISTER SUSPENDED.

Cornwall, Ont., August 1.—The committee of the Montreal Methodist conference, which was investigating charges of improper conduct against Rev. D. Earle of Bedford Que., formerly of Delta, Ont., has completed taking evidence.

Some of the charges were sustained by the evidence, but the most serious charges were not.

The court suspended Rev. Mr. Earle from the ministry till the next ensuing session of the Montreal conference, which may deal finally with the case.

SEEWANHAKA CUP.

Canadian Yacht Took Second Race.

WEATHER CONDITIONS TODAY FAVORABLE FOR CHALLENGER.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Point Claire, Que.—Kolntoo's chances of winning in today's Seewanhaka cup race are much brighter than on the two previous days, the weather conditions being entirely favorable to her.

The wind, which is blowing from the west, is strong enough for the boats to cover the course in the time limit of three and a quarter hours, and the course, which is triangular, gives but one leg to windward to two to leeward. The crews of both boats will be the same as in yesterday's race.

Great pleasure is taken by local yachtsmen that the Challenger will have the weather conditions she needs.

Montreal, Aug. 1.—The Canadian Seewanhaka cup defender yesterday afternoon defeated the American challenger by 10 minutes and 36 seconds over a 12-mile course in windward and return. The challenger was never dangerous.

The race was sailed in an 18 knot breeze, which was too much for the Kolntoo, even with double reefed sails, while the Defender stood up well with single reefs. Every puff sent the American boat keeling over so that she exposed her centreboard. The Thorella crossed the starting line first and held the lead to the finish. There was only one period in which the American made a race of it, on the first run of two miles which she covered just twenty seconds slower than the Thorella. It was in windward work the Canadian was chiefly superior. In three beats of two miles each she gained 4.35, 4.55 and 5.32.
