A Light Market.

The farmers are all busy with their haying operations, consequently there were but few teams in the market this morning, and but little country produce changed hands. The demand for chickens was quite brisk, but there were only a

few to be had and they brought from 50 to 70 cents. Eggs were scarce at 18 cents, and the price is likely to advance in the near future. Several loads of new hay were brought in and sold for \$10 per ton. The strawberry season is now at an end, and raspberries and gooseberries have the call. This is rather an off year for all kinds of small fruits, the crop being little more than half the average.

CLERKS PLAY BALL.

Interesting Game at the Trotting Park Last Evening.

A rather interesting game of base ball between the clerks of F. B. Edgcombe's and John J. Weddall's dry good establishment was played at the trotting park last evening, and resulted in a walloping for Mr. Edgcombe's men.

There had been considerable base ball talk in dry goods circles of late, and as a great deal of doubt existed as to which of the big stores could put the best team on the diamond, a friendly match was finally agreed upon as a means of settling the much vexed question. When the rival organizations lined up for the fray at seven o'clock last evening, it was found that the Edgcombe team was five men short, while the other fellows were all on deck, and apparently in splendid fighting trim. He was always on deck, alert and ready for business, and the only thing that prevented him from pulling down flies and stopping hot grounders, was that they failed to come his way at the right moment. With the proper support Mr. Edgcombe could easily have wiped up the floor with the other fellows.

Messrs Storm, Estey and Dever constituted the battery for the unsuccessful team and Fred Allen and Albert Perkins were the battery for the victors. Tom Ratter satisfactorily performed the duty of umpire. The Edgcombe team will likely practice up a bit and ask for a return match, as they do not consider that the question of supremacy has been settled by any means.

DIVORCE NOT VALID.

An Interesting Judgement Given at Montreal.

Montreal, July 30.—Today an interesting judgment was handed out by Judge Desnoyers in the case of Bertha Daskel vs. Leon Liberman. The proceedings had been instituted by a wife against her husband for refusal to provide maintenance. The defendant pleaded that a divorce obtained by him in Boston last January and declared absolute on July 7 last discharged him from all liability. The court found that the decision of the United States court could not avail. The proof was established that the parties lived in Montreal prior to their departure for Boston on October 12 last, although when the man took proceedings for divorce on the 14th of the same month he said he was a Boston citizen. He had not then a bona fide domicile in the American city, and the American court had consequently no jurisdiction in the case. Under those circumstances Liberman was condemned to pay a fine of \$10 or go to jail for one month.

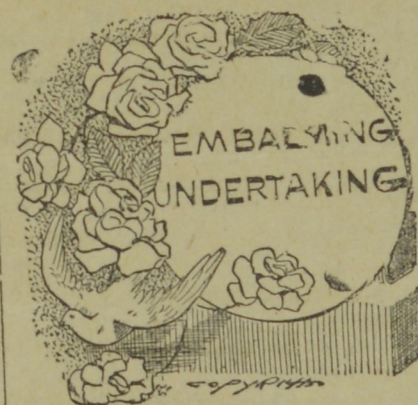
