DIVE GRACEFULLY.

King and Queen Appear to Enjoy Their Work at the Lake.

The diving horses, King and Queen, which are at the lake for the week, gave their first performance yesterday afternoon, at 5 15, and if anything it was beyond expectations of the big gathering that waited patiently for nearly 45 minutes, after the performance at the theatre was over, in order to witness the dive.

The animals, King and Queen, are almost snow white, are singularly intelligent, and seem to enjoy the plunge from the high tower into the open lake, and swim back to the landing built for them.

When the apparatus was ready, the horses were brought out. Their beauty won for them the greatest admiration from the audience. King was led to the landing stage, where his mate Queen could see him. The mare then went up the long chute composedly and with an air of ease that led the people to understand that she enjoyed the work.

When Queen arrived at the top of the chute, 40 feet above the water, she looked around for a moment, and, seeing King below, gave a delighted little neigh, to which King answered, then slowly placed her forefeet on the little shelf below the platform, and, lowering her head, launched out into space far enough to clear the platform. She struck the water head first and disappeared below the surface.

In a moment she arose and began swimming toward the landing stage, where King was standing. Queen ran over to him and began to caress him with an almost human affection. She was quickly rubbed dry, and then took her mate's former place on the stage, while King ascended the incline and went through the same performance that the mare had done.

King's dive was, if anything, even prettier than Queen's. King dived almost straight out into the air, and when descending, inclined his head. His feet are all spread out and as he strikes he sends up a mountain of water. Then, like Queen, he swims back to the stage, where he is then rubbed and sent to the stables. —Worcester, (Mass) "Telegram" July 21st 1903.

Sunday Observance.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier in reply to a delegation from the Lord's Day Alliance, asking for federal legislation to secure better observance of the Sabbath, expressed his pleasure at receiving the delegation. He felt that he could speak not merely for himself, but the Cabinet, and he hoped for the people of Canada generally in enunciating strong sympathy with the object that the delegation had in view. All Christian people agreed in prizeing the privileges of the Sunday. On his recent visit to his fatherland, France, he had been painfully impressed with the effect of the French revolution on the French Sunday, where the rest day and the privileges it secures to the people generally is to a large extent done away with, and the people are under the strain of business and occupied with toil. "No doubt," the premier went on, "we shall see our way to meet the wishes of the delegation. In the meantime we have not till now seen the full text of the Privy Council's decision which must receive careful consideration as to the extent to which it puts the question of jurisdiction to legislate in the hands of the Dominion alone." Sir Wilfrid said that in dealing with the question in a practical way

differences of opinion would undoubtedly appear, but he had confidence that the Christian charity that prevailed among Canadians would make it possible to reach a common ground as a basis of the proposed legislation. It would be quite impossible to introduce new legislation of such an important character at this stage of the present session. He could emphatically assure the delegation and the friends they represented that charters granted to various enterprises at this or any past session would not be considered by the Government as conferring any vested rights entitling to exemption from the restrictions of any future Sunday law.

A Lost Lion Hunter.

New York, Aug. 15.—By the grace of the British Consul in New York, sailing home to India with strange tales in his head, is Abdul Khadir, lion hunter and elephant tamer, who achieved local fame by losing himself in darkest Brooklyn. Dressed in Oriental robes, Abdul came ashore from the British ship Indramaya, from Singapore to Brooklyn, to buy a package of cigarettes. The British captain advised him to take little money with him. He obeyed the captain, and lacking money nearly died in Brooklyn streets. He lost his bearings and persons could not understand him. For four days he starved and slept in parks. On August 5th he was exhausted and fell to the pavement, and mumbled to passers by. In despair he kowtowed to a passing automobile. The occupants took him in the auto to the Department of Charities. There he collapsed. An ambulance surgeon said he was suffering from starvation.

For days he was taken about the city trying to find a person who could talk to him. In this way he met an officer of the British ship Indrode, who knew Abdul Khadir in Singapore. They talked, and Abdul's story was made known. While Abdul was wandering his ship had sailed away. With the aid of the British Consul the lion hunter started on the voyage to his home country yesterday.

Mecca for Americans.

"We have more enquiries from intending Americans as to lands in Western Canada this season than ever before," said Mr. Edwin Crawford of Indian Head, Assiniboia, to a Montreal reporter in discussing prospects of the Canadian West.

Mr. Crawford has been in the land agency business in Indian Head for several years and estimates that in that time he has placed at least 400 farmers from the Western States on Canadian farms. Most of them come from Ohio and Minnesota, where they have no trouble in disposing of their farms for a good figure. Better land can be purchased on the Canadian side of the line for less than half of what they received for their United States holdings. Consequently they sell out and cross over.

As to the wheat crop in the Northwest, Mr. Crawford is of opinion that it will be larger than ever this year. "There is no scarcity of labor yet," said he, "the experience of farmers being that farm laborers from Manitoba are coming into the territories, while Easterners are flocking to Manitoba."

THE LATE MRS. FREEZE.

Appreciative Sketch of a Former Fredericton Lady.

The death of Mrs. J. Arthur Freeze on Tuesday came to this community with something of a shock. While she had been very ill, and two months ago was hardly expected to live from one hour to another, she had rallied from that condition and had so far progressed that she was able to sit up from a half hour to an hour each day. But she had a relapse about ten days ago, and gradually grew weaker until she died. Mrs. Freeze was a daughter of the late John S. Dawson of Bathurst and a sister of the late Mrs. D. C. Dawson, wife of the Superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company in St. John. She received her early education at the Convent in Bathurst, and was afterwards a student at Sackville. Her brothers caught the western fever in early life. George W. was practically among the Vancouver pioneers, and has been one of its leading business men for the last twenty years. Another brother, S. E. Dawson has been connected with one of the largest wholesale business houses of Minneapolis for about the same time. The sons, who have all been home since June, are George, a machinist living in Boston, Ralph, a recent distinguished graduate of New Brunswick University, and who was appointed classical master of the Robbsey Collegiate School; David, a clerk in the Bank of Nova Scotia, and Charles, at school. Mrs. Freeze was a very active worker in the W. C. T. U., and was largely instrumental in having a Union established in Sussex. But it was to the sick in their hour of trial, and to the needy in their distress, regardless of class or creed, that she came with her kindly presence and her little gifts, and did a constant and quiet work which ceased only, when she herself was stricken and went aside from active life.

A Generous Gift.

The daughters of the late Gerhardus Clowes, had placed in St. John's church, Oromocto, a very beautiful pulpit, as a memorial of their father and mother.
