THE LUMBERMEN.

The intelligence, energy and wealth, associated with the conduct of one of New Brunswick's greatest industries is well represented by the gathering of lumbermen in Fredericton to-day. The gentlemen who gather the products of the forest are men of action—men on whom depend thousands upon thousands of our population for employment—men who embark their vigor and their means in producing from the forests staples which form an important article of commerce and without which the world could not very well move along.

They are a stalwart, intelligent, go ahead class of people, these New Brunswick lumbermen, and know pretty nearly what they want and how they want it. They are concerned in an industry that has brought millions of money to this province, and incidentally created private fortunes, which in many instances have been shared for the public good. They exercise a vast influence in the province, as a class stand high in the esteem of the people, many of them are our biggest and brainiest captains of industry.

Accident at Marysville.

Roy Robertson, son of George Robertson of Sandyville met with an accident this morning which may result in a fatality. The young man who is seventeen years of age is employed in the cotton mill. With other boys he was having some sport on the elevator at about ten o'clock this morning when he fell over to the floor below, a distance of fourteen feet. Dr. Harry McNally was summoned and found he had fractured his skull, and has but little chance of recovery. Later developments may be more favorable, but this afternoon the victim is bleeding very freely.

A Canoe Trip.

Prof. C. G. D. Roberts and Prof. Kavanagh, who have been the guests of Rev. Canon Roberts, left by the Gibson train this morning for Edmundston. They are accompanied by Prof. Roberts' two sons. The party intend making a canoe tour of some of the lakes on the upper St. John, after which they will paddle from Edmundston to this city.

THE NEW POPE.

Received Obedience of the Cardinals—
Some Appointments.

Rome, Aug. 5.—His Holiness, Pope Pius X, today received the third and last obedience of the Sacred college, with the same ceremonial as before, in the Sistine college, his holiness being in full pontifical robes, and palpably restored in mind and nerves after a good night's rest.

His Holiness rose at 5.30, saying he did not wish to change his habits. He slept last night in the room occupied by Cardinal Oreglia during the consistory. At 7.15 Pope Pius X said mass assisted only by his conclavist Monsignor Bresson.

Pope Pius said he wished to see personally most of the innumerable telegrams of congratulation received, giving instructions for an answer to those about which he cared most.

His Holiness has confirmed Cardinal Oreglia as Camerlingo, and Cardinal Agliardi will probably be secretary of state.

gestions which you may desire to make regarding this.

I shall also be glad to learn your views upon other subjects mentioned in my circular, and also upon any other matters connected with the lumber industry which you may think worthy of consideration by the government.

The Premier.

Premier Tweedie, who spoke next, thought it was very gratifying to have such a large and representative meeting of the lumbermen of the province. He referred to the introduction a few years ago of the long term lease, which he thought had been of great benefit to the lumber interest. Since this policy had been adopted by the government lumbermen had taken greater precautions against fires and the result had been beneficial all round. The lumbering industry was by far the most important in the province, and a kind of partnership existed between the lumbermen and the government in regard to the industry. It was the duty of the government to give it every protection and encouragement. Lumbermen might say that they were not making any money at the present time, but it is a well known fact that the price of lumber is as high as it ever was, indicating that the industry is in a flourishing condition. Private owners of lands have reaped a benefit from the prosperity of the lumber industry by increasing the stumpage rate while the government rate had remained stationary. Now it is proposed to make a change by making a slight addition to the stumpage rate. The industry he contended was in a much better condition than it was ten or fifteen years ago, and the lumbermen will be able to stand an increase of stumpage. It might be that in the future, the industry would again become stagnant, and if so the government would be prepared to give relief by reducing the stumpage, as it had done on a former occasion. He hoped they would go into the question in a business like way. They were all interested in the welfare of the country, and were well aware that money contributed by them in increased stumpage would be for the benefit of the people. It was not the desire of the government to cripple any industry, but rather to encourage and assist all. He was very glad that the conference of lumbermen had been called as it would furnish an opportunity for the discussion of other matters of interest in addition to the stumpage question. The premier's practical and business like address was attentively listened to.

The Forestry Expert.

Frank C. Parker, of the New York Forestry Association, was next introduced by the surveyor general, and addressed the meeting on reforestation. He spoke of the pleasure which it gave him to be present and meet the representative lumbermen and discuss with them the question of reforestation, in which he had been much interested for the past twenty five years. He explained the methods employed by the New York Forestry Association for the preservation and promulgation of trees. The association planted a quantity of seed each year, and after a year or two's growth the trees are taken up and transplanted. The Association had, a short time ago set out five hundred thousand trees in one tract and every one of them had shown good results. The questions of reforestation is becoming of greater importance year by year, and he hoped the lumbermen of New Brunswick would become interested in it.

In reply to a delegate as to the probable cost of planting and growing trees, Mr. Parker said it would be very small. Of course it would be a generation before the trees could be utilized for lumber, but it would be very little trouble to take care of them.

The plan adopted in some parts of the United States to prevent forest fires, was to have a number of fire wardens whose duty it was to guard against them. He thought the best time to fight forest fires was early in the morning when the dew was still on.

Mr. Parker answered a number of questions by Premier Tweedie, Hon. Mr. Hill and others, and gave evidence of possessing an immense fund of practical information on the subject.

At the suggestion of Premier Tweedie, Surveyor General Dann vacated the chair at twelve o'clock to allow the lumbermen to meet and perfect their organization.

Wedding at St. Marys.

Mr. James R. McConnell and Miss Isabella London, both of Glencoe in this county, were married at St. Marys, yesterday afternoon by Rev. W. D. Manzer. After the ceremony the happy couple took the C. E. railway en route to Glencoe, where they will reside in future.

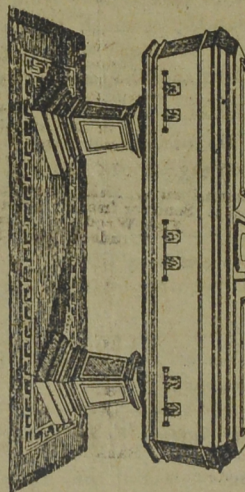
