The water in the river here, which reached freshet height several days ago, is now about stationary the cold weather having checked it somewhat. The ice opposite the city moved about fifty feet this forenoon, but the jam at Kingsclear is holding on well. The ice seems to be pretty well demoralized and cannot last many hours longer.

Can Afford to Wait.

A prominent lumberman in conversation with a representative of the Herald recently expressed the hope that the ice in the St. John river would hold on for a week or a fortnight yet. He says that it is no advantage to the lumber operators to have navigation open too early in the season, as they are not then ready to go on with their stream driving work.

Distinguished Visitors.

Miss Ida McLeod, daughter of Rev. Dr. McLeod of this city, writes home an interesting description of a visit to her school at Otto's Hoop, South Africa, by Hon. Joseph Chamberlain and his wife, who seemed to take an active interest in the school, remaining an hour and enquiring minutely into the work. The Colonial Secretary made an address to the pupils. Other members of the party were Sir Arthur Lawley, governor of the Transvaal, and General Sir Baden-Powell.

U. N. B. Defeated Milltown.

A large number of spectators witnessed the game between the Milltown Basket Ball team and that of the U. N. B., last evening at the Y. M. C. A. gym. At the end of the first half the score was 5 to 2 in favour of the University. In the second half W. Corbett, one of Milltown's forwards, fell, striking his head against an iron bar on the wall. ANOTHER MOVE.

Board of Health Decides to Enforce Compulsory Vaccination

IN THIS CITY AS A PRECAUTION AGAINST SMALLPOX.

Every Doctor Appointed a Vaccinating Officer.

The Fredericton Board of Health at a recent meeting, attended by Chairman Weaver and Messrs. James Farrell, Havelock Coy and John M. Wiley, decided in view of the alleged existence of smallpox to enforce compulsory vaccination without delay. The following is the full text of the resolution adopted in regard to the matter:

"Whereas, it is known to this Board that at least two cases of smallpox now exist in this city, whereby it becomes the duty of the Board to appoint one or more officers, (so many as may be necessary) to vaccinate all persons in this health district, who are required to be vaccinated under the regulations made by the Lieutenant Governor in council on January 19th, 1900, and published in the Royal Gazette of same date, providing for compulsory vaccination in certain cases, which regulation is now in force in this health district by reason of the knowledge of the existence of such smallpox cases in this district.

Therefore Resolved, that the Board do now proceed to appoint and designate officers to perform such vaccination in the city of Fredericton, being this health district."

Dis. Weaver, G. J. McNally and McGrath, were appointed vaccinating officers, but at a subsequent meeting it was decided that every doctor in the city should be placed on a similar footing, and the city clerk was instructed to so notify them. They are to receive forty cents for each successful vaccination, and to furnish vaccine points at their own expense. Each officer is to keep a record of his work and report to the board the names of persons vaccinated, of persons refusing to be vaccinated, and of persons immune.

Mr. Coy was appointed a committee to procure and prepare the record books and upon receipt of replies from the doctors to the notices sent them by the city clerk, the board will meet and apportion the territory to each.

It is understood that one doctor will be assigned to each ward in the city and will make house to house visitations.

THE DEATH MESSENGER.

Two Well Known County Residents Pass Away at the Hospital.

James Craig of Zionville, who was admitted to Victoria Hospital on Wednesday, suffering from tuberculosis of the lungs, succumbed to his illness last night. He was 34 years of age, and a son of Samuel Craig. A widow and five small children survive him. The body, in charge of Rev. A. D. McLeod and a brother of the deceased, was taken to Zionville by the Canada Eastern this afternoon, and will be interred at 2.30 p. m., tomorrow in the Munroe cemetery at that place. Services will be conducted in the Methodist church by Rev. A. D. McLeod. Undertaker George W. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

The death occurred at her home on King Street last night of Mrs. McAndrews, wife of William McAndrews, an employe of Palmer's tannery. Sue was a victim of that dread disease, consumption, and her death was not unexpected. The deceased, who was formerly a Miss DeLong of this city, was thirty years of age and leaves besides a husband, a family of three small children Mrs. Frank Lister is a sister of the deceased. The funeral will take place on Sunday at two p. m. George W. Adams, undertaker.

Henry Drillen, a well known resident of Nashwaaksis who has been undergoing treatment at the Victoria Hospital for

typhoid fever, died this morning. He was fifty years of age and leaves a widow and a family of two sons and two daughters. Undertaker George W. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements. Samuel Clayton, a well known resident of Nashwaak, died at that place this morning after a lengthy illness, aged 62. He is survived by one son, James Clayton, and one daughter, Mrs. Charles Manzer. The funeral will take place on Sunday at two o'clock, Robert B. Adams undertaker.

Dear Sir,—In your issue of Monday, March 16th, and in your editorial under the heading "Immediate action necessary" you make the following assertion, that "Colonel White declares that Lord Dundonald, the commander-in-chief of the Militia, favors St. John." For your information I might say that the transfer of the military headquarters of the district from Fredericton to St. John, N. B., was approved of and authorized in January, 1902, months before the Earl of Dundonald assumed command of the Canadian militia.
