

SOO TROUBLE.

Employees Looking for Pay that is Not Forthcoming.

POLICE HOLDS CROWD IN CHECK.

No Demonstration of a Disorderly Character.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Sept. 23.—There is no confirmation here of the report that Clergue has secured money to pay Speyer & Co's loan.

A crowd numbering nearly five hundred gathered about the general offices this morning, looking for pay which was promised them but was not forthcoming.

The place was well policed by town and allied companies of officers, and no demonstration was attempted up to noon, beyond considerable cheering and loud talking.

The crowd was pacified somewhat by a circular issued by Assistant Manager Coyne, saying that the president and directors in New York had been unable to raise money, but he expected that a plan endorsed by Laurier and Ross would be adopted soon, and payment of wages made and work resumed.

Promise was made that the men would get their money as soon as possible, and they were advised to take work elsewhere in the meantime.

A ROUGH GAME.

Winnipeg Football Player Fatally Injured.

FINISHING TOUCHES.

Cabinet Preparing for Close of the Session.

MEASURES YET TO RECEIVE ATTENTION IN PARLIAMENT.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—The Cabinet held an all day meeting Saturday, when the business for the balance of the session was considered.

Government measures not yet disposed of are few, the audit account bill which it is proposed to proceed with, notwithstanding rumors to the contrary, being probably the principal one.

The civil service resolution will likely be up again tomorrow morning and the third reading of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway bill will also be on for consideration.

Although to prophecy is idle there is good reason to hope that three weeks more will see the work of the session completed.

The cabinet also put the finishing touches to the supplementary estimates and these will be down this week.

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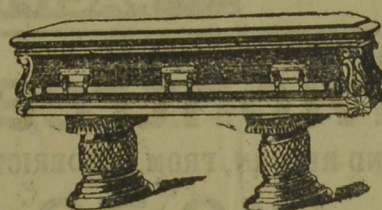
