THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

Nominations Made Today Throughout the County.

Today is the last day for the nomination of candidates for the municipal

election to be held on Tuesday of next week. As far as can be ascertained there will be contests in Stanley, St. Marys, Douglas, Bright, Queensbury, Southampton, Prince Wm. and Canterbury. Wm. Graham, an enterprising farmer of Scotch Settlement will oppose the old councillors Messrs. McKeen and Reynolds in Bright, and will no doubt put up a strong fight. In Douglas Asa Currie, of Royal Road has been nominated, and Couns. McFarlane and Estey are also in the field. In Stanley the candidates are Couns. McMinamin and Messrs. Hinchey, Ford and Peacock. In St. Marys the candidates will likely be Coun. Young, C. N. Goodspeed, Charles Forbes, and possibly a man from the lower end of the parish. In Southampton James T. Marsten is opposing the old councillors Brooks and Fawcett, and is said to be making a strong fight against the latter. Coun. Timmons, M. B. McNally, and M. A. Hagerman will likely be the candidates in Queensbury.

The indications are that there will be no contest in Dumfries, McAdam, New Maryland, North Lake, Manners Sutton and McAdam.

TROJANS ON TOP

Carried Off Honors at Driving Park

IN THE BICYCLE RACES AND ATHLETIC EVENTS.

Fast Time Made by Fred Sweeney in the 100 Yards Dash.

The athletic sports at the trotting park on Saturday afternoon, though keenly contested, were not a success in point of attendance, not more than one hundred persons being present. There were in all eight events, there being bicycle races and the remainder athletic competitions. The presence of several outside athletes, notably F. B. Sweeney, the crack sprinter of St. John, Cowans of Halifax, and E. C. Squires, of Bath, Carleton county, who has acquired quite a reputation as an athlete, lent considerable interest to the proceedings. Sweeney won the hundred yards dash over Finnemore and Hazlett in ten seconds, which is considered pretty fast time.

Edward Inch of the Century Racing club, was an easy winner in the quarter mile bicycle race, Brock Allen taking second place.

The one mile open was won by Chaucey Coleman of the Trojans, in 2:51, which was slow time, considering the condition of the track. Inch finished second and Allen third.

The two mile open was the best bicycle race of the afternoon. It was won by Coleman, although Inch and Allen, the C. R. C. men, put up a stiff fight against him. The time was 5:33 which is not considered very fast.

The Trojans certainly got the best of the bicycle races, and are much elated over their success. It is only fair to Brock Allen, the C. R. C.'s head man, however, to say that he had done no racing since the July meet, and allowed himself to get out of condition.

One mile open—Coleman, Trojans, 1st; Inch, C. R. C., 2nd; Allen, C. R. C., 3rd. Time, 2:51. Running broad jump—Cowans, Halifax, 1st; Squires, Bath, 2nd; H. M. Blair, C. R. C., 3rd. Distance, 9 ft., 6 inches.

Quarter mile run—Finnemore, Trojans 1st. time, 55½. Only one started in this event.

Two mile open—Coleman, Trojans 1st; Allen C. R. C., 2nd; Inch C. R. C., 2nd. Time 5:38.

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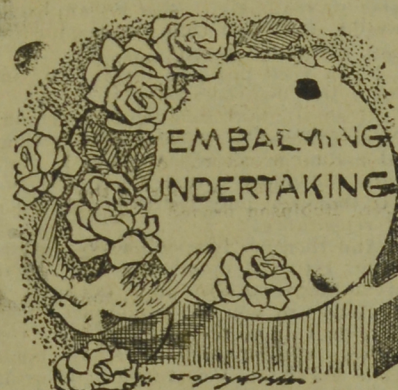
