An Interesting Budget of News.

Upper Magaguadavic.

(Special Correspondence to the Herald.)

A. W. Price's Camp, Dec. 22.—I suppose the readers of the Herald would be glad to hear from our camp and all lumber camps. We are the happiest people in the world. We have our three square meals a day and a good place to sleep. There are three grades of men, number one, two and three. The first grade is the elderly men, teamsters and choppers, the second is swamper and team tenders and the third is the yard tenders and road monkeys. Will give you a description of our building. Its a large frame structure inclosed with boards and tar paper. The frame is a new kind of lumber, we call it black walnut and the men are nearly the same, all but the walnut. You would think they were a colored minstrel troupe when they arrive in camp, but a happier people are not born.

The Magaguadavic Lake is only a short distance from our camp. On the bank of the lake is a fine sportsman's camp. Will hasten to tell you about our men how they are detailed in the morning for duty. Simon Goodine draws the straps on the leading team and understands his business. Dan Jordan and Wm. Ryan, choppers; Allie Morrison and Ben Stillwell, swamper; Capt. Scott, team tender; Simon Boone, yard tender; this is Goodine's party. The next is Ben Gray, teamster, he pulls the reins over a good pair and says he won't be beat. Jack Woodworth and Ed Stillwell do the chopping, Cecil Brewer and Douglas Estey the swamping, Elijah Moorehouse, team tender; Garfield Boone, yard tender; the above is Gray's party. Brewer's team—Odbur Jewett handles that team and knows how its done. His crew is Herbert Hanson and Ezra Hanson, choppers, H. Brown, swamper; Charley McLean, team tender; Marvin Hanson, swamper; B. Griffiths, yard tender. Simeon Manual drives a good team and he knows it and can boast a little on his team and his men, which consists of Hun Whitehead and Jim Loane, swamper; Hunny's head is pretty gray but he can do it yet; Wilus Manual, chopper; Arthur White, yard tender. Next team Jed Hanson, who is hauling from the stump to the stream and is doing good work. He hauls to the stream from fifty to sixty times each day with his crew, which consists of George McDonald, chopper; Capt. Tucker, team tender; Lin Morehouse, swamper. Herman Morehouse drives the blacks; his party is A. Nason, chopper; Spruce Hanson, team tender; Harry Brewer, swamper. This is the inventory of our party.

I came near forgetting our staff of cooks. Sandy Brewer does the pastry work and its done in good shape. We have pie every morning for breakfast. We live above the average; cannot give you the particulars, it would take too much space in your valuable paper. Millard Brewer is assistant cook.

We have over a thousand pieces to the stream. There will be a number of our going home to spend Christmas. No doubt they will be welcomed by their best girls, whose sadness will turn to gladness. We wish the boys a Merry Christmas.
