

HOUSE TO-DAY.

Mr. Sifton Makes Vigorous Defence of the Government.

INVITED BORDEN TO SAY

Whether He Was Opposed to Eastern Section of the G. T.

OPPOSITION LEADER EVASIVE.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—When the House opened today Hon. Mr. Sifton resumed the debate on the Grand Trunk Pacific project.

He said it could be taken for granted that what Mr. Blair had said was the worst that could be said about the project.

He proceeded with vigor to defend the agreement as made by the government.

Mr. Sifton said the eastern section of the railway was a necessity, for Intercolonial would not be able to haul all the business offered from the west in the course of a few years. The present policy is not an abandonment of the policy inaugurated when the I. C. R. was brought to Montreal.

Mr. Sifton, continuing, said that the longer the question of paralleling existing lines was discussed, the more the opposition would wish they had let this part of it alone.

He invited the leader of the opposition to say whether he endorsed the objection to the line from Quebec to Moncton.

Mr. Borden—"You will hear it all right. Don't be alarmed." (Laughter.)

A NEW OFFICIAL.

Capt. Marshall Appointed District Staff Adjutant at St. John.

Marsh at the police court this morning, and elected to be tried by him. He afterwards pleaded guilty to the theft of a gold watch and chain belonging to John Ladds, and was remanded until Monday next for sentence. H. F. McLeod appeared as counsel for the prisoner. It is scarcely likely that the other charges against Dennison will be pressed. He claims that at the time he committed the theft he was under the influence of liquor.

TWO KILLED.

Fatal Collision on the Ontario Division of the C. P. R.

ENGINE AND CARS BADLY SMASHED.

All Day to Clear the Line.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Kingston, Ont., Aug. 13.—A collision occurred early this morning on the Canadian Pacific railway between a light engine and a freight train, in which Engineer Patrick Hallihan and Brakeman John Forsyth, both of Havelock, were killed.

The accident occurred about two and a half miles from Sharbot Lake. The light engine was smashed into fragments while the freight engine and cars were piled in heaps.

The bodies of the trainmen were taken from the wreck and sent to Sharbot Lake. It will take almost all day to clear the line.

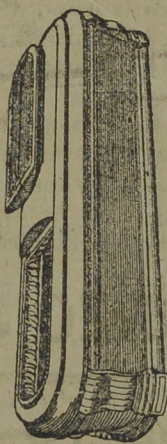
