HONEYCOMBING SOCIAL LIFE

Says Rev. Dr. Armstrong of the Gambling Evil.

Rev. Dr. Armstrong preached an eloquent and forceful sermon on gambling, Sunday evening in St. Paul's church, Ottawa. There is a proverb he said, that only knaves and fools gamble. There are plenty of knaves in search for fools, and plenty of hawks in search for pigeons to pluck. The first question concerning gambling is: "Is it right or is it wrong?—not, is it conventional?" We should ask not merely is there no harm in it, but is there any good. Some people look upon it as an innocent excitement, others as a horror of evil and wrong. Gambling has two elements in it: first the element of chance or luck; second that of getting money without one equivalent. Gambling is really getting money without an equivalent and is dishonest.

The reverend gentleman gave many illustrations of his remarks, considering football, lacrosse and other games. Betting, he continued, is the degradation of these good athletic games like football and lacrosse. To play for play's sake is good and healthful, but the whole aspect is changed when one plays for money. It is degradation for the players themselves and one who respects himself would retire from the team if games are only an occasion for gambling and betting. The degradation of the players is to be placed on the level of a race horse or a prizefighter. Unless the betting element can be eliminated from the games they will lose all support from respectable people. Gaming is not only intrinsically dishonest as an attempt to get something for nothing; but it hardens the sympathies, destroys friendship, degrades the character, and if we look for the results we find them in ruined lives, blighted homes, suicides' graves, and madhouses. The preacher quoted from Lavater, De-pew, Herbert Spencer and Charles Kingsley, their verdict as to the harmful effects of all gambling and betting.

He referred to that other form of the vice which attains among commercial men, who though they would not handle cards or dice, but would use their own and other people's money on chance.

The Walking Record.

The Fredericton Herald says: "Mrs. Boake, an English lady who returned with her husband a few days ago from a successful hunting trip on the Miramichi, distinguished herself by walking twenty-five miles through the woods in a single day. A short time before Miss Wheeler, of Buffalo, covered the same section of country, and Mrs. Boake started to beat her record and did it."

That's all right, as far as it goes, but records are not made that way. There's an absence of particulars. We have ladies on the Miramichi who don't call a one day's walk of even 25 miles, duly authenticated, anything to boast of. It was only on the morning of 31st Oct. that Mrs. John Robinson and Miss Lonsbury started from one of Ed. Merz's hunting camps on Little Bald Mountain, N. W. Miramichi, and walked to John Way's, near the end of the Chaplin Island road by three o'clock the afternoon of the next day. The distance is over forty miles. It is such sustained walking as this on two consecutive days over trail for seven miles and the remaining thirty-five over portage that counts. Walking from nowhere to nowhere in "the Miramichi woods" is all right for a "fish story," but it don't go down as a record performance.

British Versus Canadian Wheat.

B. & J. Alta.—Is British or Canadian wheat the better, and which commands the higher price in England?

Ans.—As a rule the wheat grown in Great Britain is fall wheat and belongs to what is known as soft wheat; this is much the same and little or no better than No. 1 fall wheat grown in Canada. Canadian fall wheat is not nearly equal to the best Canadian spring wheat known as No. 1 hard which is admitted to be the best wheat in the world. A hard wheat is always superior to a soft wheat and much of the No. 1 hard imported into Great Britain from Canada and the United States is used to mix with the soft wheats of Britain in order to improve the value of the flour. No. 1 hard wheat sells for a higher price in Great Britain than the best English grown wheat. This is the wheat from which Ogilvie's Flour is made.

Did No Good in the Cellar.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 13.—An interesting bit of ancient history came before the W. C. T. U., convention, when one of the members announced that the famous world's temperance petition, signed by millions of people in fifty countries, prepared under the direction of Miss Frances Willard, has been stored in the Dominion Methodist Church in six big packing boxes for the past six years. The petition was to have been presented to the crowned heads of the world. It went to Queen Victoria and the President of the United States, but its journey ceased with Canada, and here it has been resting ever since. The convention were astonished and nonplussed at the news. It was finally decided to write to Mrs. L. Stevens, president of the National Women's Temperance Union, for the United States, asking that something be done to have the famous petition removed and started on the rest of its journey.

Political Conjectures.

It is rumored in Ottawa that the railway commission will consist of Hon. A. G. Blair, A. B. Aylesworth and C. W. Spencer, also that Hon. S. N. Parent will retire from the position of Premier of Quebec to become chairman of a commission to build the Government's part of the transcontinental line, and will be succeeded within a few days by Mr. Targeon or Mr. Archambault.
