AROUND THE MARKET.

Country Produce Very Plentiful and Good Prices Obtained.

The market this morning was the largest for some weeks, and all lines of country produce were displayed in the cordon of teams which surrounded the city hall. The country roads are in very good condition, considering the recent wet weather, and people living a considerable distance out, are enabled to get their produce into market without difficulty.

There was lots of poultry in the market this morning and it seemed to be of extra good quality. Chickens brought from 45 to 65 cents a pair, ducks 75 and 80 cents per pair, and geese from 75 to 90 cents each. Turkeys were rather scarce and the selling price was 14 and 15 cents per pound.

Some good carcasses of pork brought 6½ and 7 cents per pound, and beef sold at 5 and 6 cents by the quarter. Lamb is still worth 7 and 8 cents per pound.

Apples were quite plentiful and the fall varieties brought from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per barrel for the best quality. Potatoes continue firm at 90 cents and \$1 per barrel and turnips are still worth 50 cents.

There has been a great scarcity of eggs for some weeks and the price has gone up to 25 cents per dozen. Even at the high figure one is not always sure of getting the very best that is going.

Good roll butter is now selling for 22 cents by the pound, and that in tubs brings 20 cents.

There has been very little hay brought into the market this season, but no doubt when the roads get in condition for sledding there will be lots to be had. Good English hay is now worth \$8 and \$9 per ton.

SUPREME COURT.

Fredericton Parties Interested in Two Cases Before Full Bench.

The following county court appeal cases were argued in the supreme court this morning:

McRae (def't) appellant and Brown (plff) respondent. George W. Allen, K. C., supports appeal from the Northumberland county court. A. R. Slipp, contra. Court considers.

W. E. Cadwallader (def't) appellant, and A. E. Hanson (plff) respondent. R. W. McLellan supports appeal from the York County court. O. S. Crockett contra, not called. Appeal dismissed with costs.

Borpee (left) appellant and McCoy (plff) respondent—A. R. Slipp supports appeal from York county court;—R. W. McLellan contra. Appeal allowed with costs. Case to go to the county court to enter verdict for defendant with costs.

This being the last case on the docket, the chief justice adjourned the court until Thursday next. He intimated that the court would deliver judgments on Friday, November 27th.

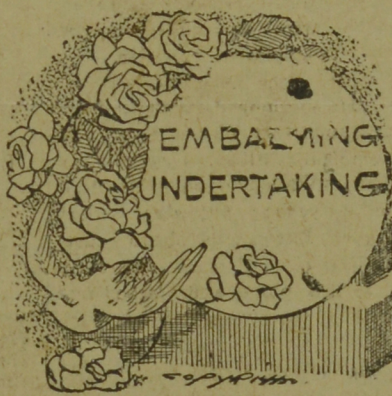
