LOYALTY.

The great stock in trade of the Tory party used to be loyalty. With them it was used in the place of charity—to cover a multitude of sins. At the last general election it was used for all that it was worth, with Mr. Tarte and the French Canadians, as the great private scare-crow. That can't work now. They have Mr. Tarte, the traitor, snugly ensconced in the bosom of the great and only "trooly" loyalty party of Canada. But it would seem that there is ahead of Canadians a time coming when their loyalty will be tested. It is a very easy matter to shout loyalty and denounce your political opponents as traitors; it is quite another thing to do something, or make some sacrifice in the interests of Canada and the Empire. The difference between the two parties, on this subject, is now very evident. The Tory loyalty consisted of banquets at which the champagne flowed like water—paid for by the Canadian taxpayer—followed by long-winded speeches of self-glorification. That's all. The Liberals, when they came into power proceeded to do. By the one master stroke, the preferential tariff, they did more for the unity of the British Empire than has ever been done in our history.

It now looks as if our Tory friends will before very long have to enter the fiery furnace where their loyalty will be tried to the utmost. The great underlying principle of the Right Hon. Mr. Chamberlain's preferential scheme in favor of the colonies as against foreign countries, is that the colonies must make up to Great Britain the trade her manufacturers lost by putting on a tariff against foreigners. What are our good friends led by Mr. Tarte, who are clamouring for higher protection and the repeal of our preferential tariff going to do about it when they are called upon to choose whom they will serve, the God of high protection, or that lowering of the tariff towards the old motherland, which makes possible that great Imperial Federation of the British Empire, that we used to hear about at election times. It is strange how chickens will come home to roost.

GAMEY.

The Montreal Herald naively observes that it is about time the Ontario Tories were giving Gamey another banquet. That's right. They should have one about every week, and in order to purify such a consummate scoundrel, drink the toasts in carbolic acid.
