

HAVE TO WALK.

Montreal Citizens Suffering Inconvenience of Street Car Tie-Up.

MEN STRUCK EARLY THIS MORNING.

Athletes and Students Have Volunteered Their Services.

TROUBLE FEARED TONIGHT

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Montreal, May 23.—This city is in the throes of a second street railway strike within a year, and this morning thousands of people had to walk to work.

The men met and voted in favor of a strike early this morning. Out of thirteen hundred at the meeting, only twenty voted nay.

The electrical workers, by a vote of 183 to 14, also decided to go out.

The strike does not promise to be as complete a tie-up as that of last winter, when not a single car moved.

At ten o'clock this morning the company had five cars on the line, and so far there has been no trouble.

Public sympathy is in a large measure with the company.

Members of the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association have volunteered to act as conductors, and students of the mechanical engineering department of McGill University have offered their services as motormen.

It is feared there will be disturbances tonight, if the company persists in keeping their lines open.

There is no question of wages involved. The men are fighting for recognition of the union, and recognize that if they lose they will be in the same position as they were before the strike last winter.

WOULD EXTEND LINES EAST.

Mr. H. J. Logan Believes Scheme Would Aid the G. T. R. Project.

Montreal, May 23.—Mr. H. J. Logan M. P. for Cumberland county, Nova Scotia, who was at the Windsor yesterday on his way up to Ottawa, said that if the Grand Trunk amended its scheme by adding a line from Quebec to Moncton it would be possible for it to capture the support of the people of the Maritime Provinces.

Mr. Logan added that many members, himself included, would prefer to see a government railway from Quebec through the temperate belt north of the division of watershed running up to and through the northwestern prairies to a line subsidized and built by any existing railway company.

What they wanted was a railway that would bind the thickly populated districts of the east with the new grain producing territories in the west. They did not want to see this grain carried to the Atlantic through American ports. It was because he believed that a government railway, whether an extension of the Intercolonial or an entirely new road from Quebec would best serve this purpose that he and others favored a national line.

NO TORONTO STRIKE.

Street Railway Co. and Employees Have an Understanding.

Toronto, May 23.—There will no strike of the street car employees of Toronto this year. A contract has been made for one year by the company with their employees.

The men have secured many concessions. While the motormen and conductors do not get an increase of pay, shed men and car washers are granted a very substantial increase. The company agree to pay one half the cost of uniforms for the first year men, and to supply them free to all employees in the service for two years or more.

MOVEMENT COLLAPSED.

London, May 23.—The Times correspondent at Uskurk, Turkey, confirms the report that the Albanians had over 200 killed in recent fighting near Kakova. The Albanians are alarmed to find the Turks in earnest, the majority of their leaders have submitted, and it is believed the Albanian movement has practically collapsed.

A MONCTON BLAZE.

Moncton, May 23.—A fire occurred here this morning in the house owned by Jas. A. McAnn. It was badly gutted by fire and water, the roof being burned off.

N. B. OIL OPERATIONS.

Great Promise in the Extension of the Petroleum Business.

Matthew Lodge, secretary of the New Brunswick Petroleum Company, told a Telegraph reporter last evening that another oil well had been successfully shot on the company's oil fields in Albert county.

The company are extending their operations into Albert county and will shortly erect works there, the field extends about two miles into Albert county at present.

Five boring rigs are now working night and day, and the company are connecting their producing wells with pumps and the oil is being stored in tanks. These tanks at the wells will be connected by a pipe line with central tanks, and plans are now being prepared for the erection of a small refinery, with a capacity of about 150 barrels daily. The company expect in a short time to have twenty boring rigs working, three of which will be engaged in Northumberland, Kent and Kings counties for exploration purposes, the others will be confined to the field that has been producing in order to sink as many wells as possible this summer.

The company's best producing well, which has been connected with the pumps, is turning out twelve barrels a day.

Indications of oil have been found at Blackville in Northumberland county, on the Cobequid river in Kent county, and at Tracadie and Point Moisselle in Gloucester county. Kings county is simply an extension of the present oil fields and the company expect to be successful in their explorations there.

WILL THINK IT OVER.

Dr. Emery Not Yet Decided to Become Asylum Superintendent.

At a meeting of the asylum commission yesterday at St. John, Dr. A. F. Emery was in attendance, and expressed gratification at the offer made him to become medical superintendent of the asylum. He said he recognized the importance and value of the position, but that to accept would be the breaking up of associations and that, considering this and the fact of his having a large practice, he felt he should give the matter some consideration before deciding.

His request was granted, and it is understood that in a short time Dr. Emery will make up his mind as to whether he will accept. Meantime, Dr. Travers, assistant superintendent, will be in charge with Dr. G. A. B. Addy as assistant. Dr. Addy will be able to devote a portion of each day to the work.

Will Guarantee Bonds.

Ottawa, May 23.—The Dominion government has not only done away with the policy of granting land grants to railways, but the time for granting cash subsidies seems also to be fast disappearing.

It is understood that the government has decided to guarantee the interest on the bonds of that portion of the Canadian Northern to be built from Grand View to Edmonton, a distance of about 600 miles. It is also understood that security will be taken on the road for this guarantee.

Messrs MacKenzie & Mann were promised assistance for this undertaking last year, and this will be the shape that the aid will take.

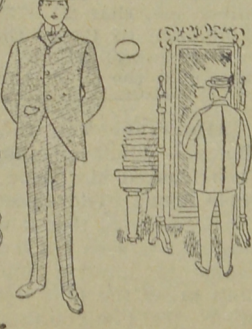
