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MISSING DAUGHTER

Mrs. Lotham, of Birmingham, England,

IS IN HALIFAX PURSUING HER SEARCH.

When Last Heard From the Girl Was in Oshawa, Ont., in Good Health.

Halifax, Jan. 9. — Mrs. Priscilla Latham, of Birmingham, England, came all the way from that city to look up her daughter and is now in Halifax. Mrs. Latham is a rather ladylike looking woman of middle age and she is very earnest in her search. Years ago the Latham family was a happy and united one and their little home at Birmingham was an ideal one. But the dread destroyer death one day entered the happy home and carried off the head of the house, who left a widow and two children, a boy and a girl. The mother worked for her children and as the boy grew to young manhood and looked about in preparation for his future he was attracted by the advantages of Canada and came to this country. He secured employment on the Grand Trunk Railway and later sent a ticket to his sister who followed him out to the Dominion. It was about four years ago that she came to Canada and she located in Ontario. For two years her mother received letters from her regularly, all evidencing the love of a dutiful child for the mother.

But suddenly the letters ceased, and try as she would the agonized mother could gain no tidings of her daughter nor learn the cause of her failure to write further. Finally Mrs. Latham decided to come to Canada and find her girl or learn her fate.

The last letter received was dated April, 1901, and the girl, Agnes Alice, gave no intimation of being in ill health or of contemplating removal from Oshawa, Ont., where she was at that date employed. In Birmingham mother and daughter had been connected with the Salvation Army, and thinking she would continue her connection with the Army in Canada Mrs. Latham had the officials of the organization try to locate the girl, but they were unable to do so and it is thought therefore that she did not continue her connection with the S. A. after coming to Canada.

Mrs. Latham is staying at the Home for Aged Ladies, Göttingen Street, the matron of which is taking much interest in the matter and using every effort to locate the missing girl.

An Echo reporter saw Mrs. Latham at the Home yesterday and while answering a few questions in relation to her girl, she burst into tears and was comforted by the kind-hearted matron who has become very much attached to her. In answer to the reporter Mrs. Latham said: "It will be two years in April next since I heard from my girl. In April 1901, she was at Oshawa, Ont., and wrote that she was in good health. She came to Canada about four years ago. My son does not know where she is. She is a rather tall girl, pleasant looking, and will be twenty-three years of age in April. I am sure if she knew I was in Halifax, and she was able to do so, she would hasten to me immediately, so sure do I feel of her love."

Mrs. Latham decided to remain in Halifax and direct some inquiries from here before proceeding further west and perhaps missing the girl and using up all her funds.

Decided on Merit Alone.

Washington, Jan. 8.—At the meeting of the National Association of State Universities it was decided in executive session that the appointments of students from educational institutions in the United States to the Cecil Rhodes scholarships in Oxford University must be based on educational and social tests, with no regard whatever for political influence.

This conclusion is in accord with the views of the trustees of the Cecil Rhodes fund. The rest of the session was devoted to answering questions asked by Dr. George R. Parkin, C. M. G., of Toronto, agent of the Cecil Rhodes scholarships, regarding local educational conditions.

FLEMING GOES TO JAIL.

Rather than Pay for His Caddy's Eye.

Plattsburg, N. Y., Jan. 8.—In an effort to avoid payment of a judgment of \$6,495, obtained by George Salem, a golf caddy, whom he struck in the face with a golf stick, David Fleming of 115 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, will remain for six months within the jail limits of Elizabethtown, Essex County. He surrendered himself yesterday to the Sheriff at that place, and gave bonds in the sum of \$13,000.

The occurrence which caused all the trouble took place July 21, 1902, at Lake Placid. Fleming became angry after missing a stroke at golf, and gave vent to his feelings by striking his caddy in the face with his club, totally destroying the sight of one eye. Fleming had the boy taken to a hospital in Montreal. He paid the expense of an operation, amounting to \$75, and gave the boy \$45 besides.

Salem, who is ten years of age brought suit through his attorneys, and obtained a judgment of \$6,000 and costs. A property execution was issued, and returned, unsatisfied. Then a body execution was issued, and yesterday Fleming arrived in Elizabethtown, prepared to stay in the jail limits for six months. He slept in the Sheriff's residence last night, as by some misunderstanding his bondsman, ex-Assemblyman George A. Stevens, proprietor of the Stevens House at Lake Placid, did not reach there until today.

Fleming is now established in luxurious quarters in the Deer's Head Inn, inside the jail limits at Elizabethtown; he must stay for six months within an imaginary circle one mile in diameter, of which the jail is the centre. At the expiration of the six months he cannot be re-arrested for another six months, and then only when he is found within the limits of New York State.

EATEN BY WOLVES.

The Danger of Winter Travel in Roumania.

EIGHT OFFICIALS IN ONE PARTY OVERPOWERED.

Many Other Cases Are Also Reported.

New York, Jan. 8.—The Sun has the following from Bucharest:—Every day as the winter advances accounts are received of the ravages of wolves throughout Roumania. Every part of the country appears to be infested with these animals. Hardly a newspaper appears without reports of half a dozen cases where persons have been attacked and devoured by wolves.

Last Wednesday eight officials left Tulcea on their way to Galatz on three sledges. When their arrival was not reported the mounted police started a search for them, and on Thursday they found three broken sledges. A number of empty revolvers and the trampled, bloody snow told the story of the tragedy that had happened. Even the harness had been devoured by the famished beasts.

A gendarme who was passing the edge of the forest of Badeni, near Ploesti, in the afternoon, was pursued by a pack of wolves. The gendarme unsling his carbine, and fired three cartridges at them as he galloped along the road. Then he emptied his revolvers and killed several of the pack. They kept on pursuing him, and finally he drew his long cutting sword and slashed at each wolf as it attempted to bring down his horse. The gendarme reached Ploesti in an exhausted condition, the wolves giving up the chase not far from that place. There have been scores of similar happenings.
