

WANTS BLOOD.

Colchester Tory M. P. Made
Fighting Speech in
Parliament.

NO USE FOR YANKEES AND
THEIR DESIGNING WAYS.

The House Was Greatly
Amused.

Ottawa, June 19.—When the bill guaranteeing the bonds of the Canada Northern Railway was before the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Seymour E. Gourley, the belligerent Tory M. P. for Colchester, N. S., delivered another of his fiery speeches which kept the members amused for nearly an hour.

Mr. Gourley advocated a policy of building railways by the thousands of miles. He declared the country to be almost as barren of railways as when Jacques Cartier landed, and was sure that if Jacques came back, his old friend Champlain and the great Indian chiefs would be ashamed of the progress of the country.

In order to place Canada in the position where she could control the whole world and face any power—but especially his bete noire, the United States—Mr. Gourley wants to see 50,000 miles of line built in the next ten years. He left the house to understand that he was in favor of subsidizing all these miles, but he was not at all clear and had not settled in his own mind whether the guaranteeing of bonds was a proper policy. Canada has to play the game as men and not as children and fill the eye of the world, in Mr. Gourley's estimation, to enable it to take its proper place in the world.

The member for Colchester contends that there is a regular mathematical progression and ratio between the building of railways and the prosperity of a country. About an hour after he started he asked for the subsidizing of the Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk, Trans-Canada and every other transcontinental road, but the trans Canada was his particular pet.

Mr. Gourley took up over an hour of the time of the committee and it cannot honestly be said that he accomplished anything except to afford amusement for both sides of the house. He wandered far afield from the subject of discussion. He is a man whose fluency of language seems to lead him on and on, but he flies off from one picture to another just as some new idea is suggested to his mind. He is an ardent imperialist, with a special detestation of the United States and its people, and his speeches always contain a large element of the spread eagle and jingo which he is at great pains to denounce when it is manifested by an American.

Some of the "gems" of his speech yesterday were the following:

"I give the Americans credit for always speaking well of themselves, while detesting their very existence. If ever I say a word in favor of the United States I will expect my U. E. L. ancestors to rise up from their graves."

"The constitution of the United States is a jumble of tyrannies and I would prefer the tyranny of Algiers to that of the States. In Algiers you only have one tyranny, but in the states you have the tyranny of congress for two years, the tyranny of the senate for six years, the tyranny of the president for four years, and the Supreme court that hoeses them all eternally and forever."

"I am glad to see that the government has got out a map which shows the immensity of this country. When my little boy saw it he said: 'Pa, the United States is gone now; we are sitting on it in Canada'."

"God sent Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper like the prophets of old, but they were treated like John the Baptist and the people refused to take the bread of eternal life from them."

"I am an admirer of the English race, but it is of the English race of forty to fifty years ago. Thank God there is new vigor coming into the race today through Mr. Chamberlain's efforts."

"A more insulting thing never happened to a sea-loving people like the Anglo-Saxons than to have all our coast from 54.40 up to Alaska stolen by a lot of greedy Yankees. They call themselves statesmen, but I would be sorry to see a school boy in Canada half so stupid as those statesmen."

"We must give the Grand Trunk notice that in two years they must leave Port-

land, tear up their terminals there and send no further Canadian traffic there. Compensate them even, but let us get rid of the disgrace of having a transcontinental road carrying traffic to and dumping it at a Yankee port. How can we be a self-respecting people under conditions of that kind?"

CIRCUIT COURT.

The Jury Disagreed in Case of Frederick vs. Gibson.

In the case of Ira Frederick vs. the executors of the estate of the late Wm. Gibbon, tried before Chief Justice Tuck at the Circuit court yesterday, the jury failed to agree upon a verdict. They were out over two hours, and on returning to court informed His Honor that they stood 4 to 3, and that there was no prospect of an agreement. His Honor then dismissed them from further attendance. R. W. McLellan for plaintiff, A. B. Connell, K. C., and J. R. Murphy, K. C., for defendant. The parties to the suit belong to Carturbury, and the action was one of trover and trespass, \$800 damages being claimed. It is understood the majority of the jury were in favor of the plaintiff, and that he will ask for a new trial.

The case of A. B. Willmot, administrator of the estate of the late J. D. Macpherson vs. John Macpherson, was taken up this morning by the chief justice without a jury. The action has been brought to recover an amount in the vicinity of \$800, due the estate for goods sold the defendant. The defence set up is that the goods were supplied as an offset of monies loaned from time to time to A. D. Macpherson, and that there was agreement between the late J. D. Macpherson and the defendant to that effect. J. D. Phinney, K. C. is counsel for plaintiff, George W. Allen, K. C. for defendant.

The case was finished at four o'clock, when His Honor delivered judgment for the defendant with leave for the plaintiff to move the court en banc for to enter a verdict for the amount due.

The court then adjourned sine die.

The E'gcombe cases will likely be submitted to a board of arbitration composed of Sheriff Sterling, M. Lemont and T. H. Colter.

LABOR AGITATORS.

From the United States Hit by Loughhead's Bill.

Ottawa, June 19.—The Senate Banking committee this morning received the report of the sub-committee on Senator Loughhead's bill regarding labor agitations.

The sub-committee made a re-draft of the bill which makes it criminal for any one not a British subject or not domiciled in Canada, to urge strikes or lockouts, but does not apply to those coming over to endeavor to settle disputes. The word "alien" has been changed to "not a British subject."

The bill was reported as drafted by the sub-committee.

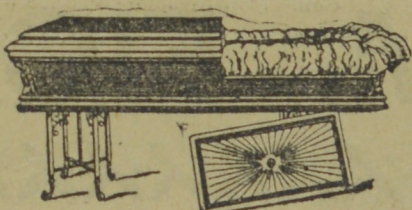
