PAYS HEARTY TRIBUTE TO MINISTER OF RAILWAYS.

The Toronto Globe, the leading newspaper of Canada, pays a high tribute to the ability and energy Hon. A. G. Blair is manifesting as Minister of Railways and Canals. It says that it is fortunate that at this juncture the minister at the head of the department is both competent and courageous. On many occasions Mr. Blair has fearlessly and consistently given the great railway corporations to understand that while he is in possession of the portfolio they must travel the straight road if they wish to reduce parliamentary interference to a minimum. In all his contentions and decisions nothing is more characteristic of him than his impartiality, which is so pronounced that the smallest railway management is as safe under his guardianship as the most powerful.

Over and over again, within the past few years, Mr. Blair has induced parliament to interfere with the railway companies in ways which were formerly never thought of, but which are obviously in the direction of conserving, and even increasing, public control of virtually monopolistic franchises. For example, the selection of stations must now be made subject to the approval of the Governor-General in Council, so that it is more difficult than it formerly was for a railway company to ruin a settlement by locating a station just near enough, and distant enough, to prove a detriment instead of an advantage.

A good example of Mr. Blair's courage and fairness, says the Globe, was afforded the other day by his treatment of the Grand Trunk Railway Company's bill authorizing a loan of fifty million dollars for the improvement of the system. He pointed out to the Railway Committee that under its provisions there was nothing to hinder the company spending the greater part of this capital outside of Canada, and asked that a clause be inserted providing that the expenditures be made subject to the approval of the governor in council. This proposal was at once accepted by the railway company's representative, and, from all that is known of the Grand Trunk management, there need be no doubt that it will be acted upon in good faith. It is to be hoped that when the time comes for Mr. Blair to resign his portfolio it may pass into the hands of a successor equally vigilant and determined.

THE HUNT CLUB.

Fredericton's Latest Sport- ing Organization.

HAD ITS FIRST OUTING—A MAGNIFICENT GATHERING OF EMINENT HORSEMEN.

To the stranger entering the city for the first time or the young man who has been away to seek fresh fields and pasture anew and returning home once more, the onward progress of the Celestial City so far as sport are concerned must strike both these very forcibly. Surely no one can say we are lagging behind the times.

We have our B. B. Club, our Base Ball association, our Skating Rink, our gorgeous carnivals, our Tennis Club, Basket Ball Club, Golf Club, Electric Automobile, and now last but not least is the latest development, a Fredericton Hunt Club with horses and riders galore.

On Good Friday morning, at about the hour of 11 o'clock the Woodstock road in the vicinity of the hospital was the scene of animated excitement. The roads converging there were disgorging numerous well known city magnates notorious as city sports mounted on the fiery and untamed steeds, mostly procurable from the well known livery of the "Celestial City," now to be known as "Hunting-shire."

Everybody were apparently up betimes, the morning was bright and cloudless with a clear pale blue sky, brilliant sun, and gentle breeze and an occasional sharpness in the air, which with the exhilarating sensation of being borne swiftly (?) through the air sent the color to the cheeks of these bold and fearless horsemen.

could notice amongst them, the master mounted on "Sly Boots," Mr. Ralph Clarke as huntsman on his light sorrel "Hat Rack," then came Mr. Billy Walker, on "Shotover," Mr. Don Neill, on "Dolly Grey," Mr. Stewart Campbell on his chestnut gelding, "the Beau of Sandall," Mr. Walker on his black mare "Queenie," by horsemen out of "Ice Maiden" and Mr. — on "Singing Bird," by Musician on one of "Lighthouse" and Mr. Arthur Shute on "Main Spring" by "Watchmaker." All present were greatly disappointed by the non appearance of Mr. Secretary Barker, who it was understood would make his first appearance on his new purchase, "Coquette" by "Sobersides." The hounds were put into covert on the Hanwell road, and before many minutes had gone by the music of their tongues made itself heard ringing out on the still air. In an instant a deafening noise ensued and horsemen by the score galloped frantically in the wake of some supposed retreating animal.
