Stairs, ex-M.P., who is identified with the re-organized Gibson Company, has secured a large block of the new stock issued by the bank, would indicate that there is something in the report.

Potato Shipment.

The demand for potatoes in the American market this season is quite brisk, but this far no very heavy shipments have been made from this locality, and there is not likely to be. J. A. Bell forwarded a carload to New York last week, and he is now loading another car which he will forward some time this week. The highest price paid by Mr. Bell so far is \$1.50 per barrel.

Native of York.

The Boston Herald, April 7th, contains a picture of Mr. Zebadec Estey Cliff, president of the Somerville, Mass., Board of Trade, and an account of the annual banquet of the Board. Mr. Cliff, who is a native of York county, is serving his third term as president of the Board. He is one of the largest suburban contractors and builders in the vicinity of Boston and is not yet 40 years old.

Kingsclear's New Residents.

W. Illingworth and family of Yorkshire, England, who are to take up their abode on the Kilburn farm at Central Kingsclear, arrived from St. John by boat on Saturday and went to Kingsclear this morning. The Kilburn property has been purchased by Dr. Wilton, a physician and surgeon from Yorkshire, who arrived here about a week ago. The party consists of three families, numbering in all eighteen persons. It is understood that the doctor has decided to practice his profession at Kingsclear.

On the Upper St. John.

John Kilburn returned on Saturday evening from a trip to the scene of his lumbering operations in Quebec province. He says that when he started for home there was three feet of snow in that locality and that it was solid enough to hold a team. The ice in the river and lakes has not yet showed signs of breaking up, and Mr. Kilburn is of the opinion that it will be the 25th anyway before driving operations commence in that region. Mr. Kilburn expects to return to Quebec about the first of next week.

EASTER SUNDAY.

How the Day was Observed in the Churches of the City.

As usual Easter Sunday was fittingly observed in the churches of the city, and the congregations at both morning and evening services had every reason to be satisfied with the elaborate preparations made for their benefit. The weather, while not as fine perhaps as those who had new Easter bonnets to show off, would have liked, was not at all unpleasant, and there was an exceptionally large turnout at both services.

At the Methodist church the services were of a particularly impressive character and were greatly enjoyed by the congregation. The pulpit platform was banked with flowers and potted plants from Miss Schleyer's conservatory and presented a fine appearance. The choir under the able leadership of L. A. Wilmot Lemont, rendered a special programme of Easter music, which was highly creditable to all concerned. A feature of the evening service was a vocal solo by Mrs. F. B. Edgecombe, with violin and piano accompaniment.

At St. Paul's church a special musical program, including several Easter anthems, was carried out at both services. Miss Maud McKee rendered a vocal solo at the evening service, in her usual charming manner.

The Easter services at St. Dunstan's church yesterday were of an impressive character. At High mass Peter's mass was used and also other special appropriate music including a solo by Miss McCaron. The music at vespers in the evening was also much appreciated. Messrs. Lawlor and Foster were in the choir and sang a very pretty "O Salutaris." The altar, which was beautifully decorated, was ablaze with hundreds of candles and presented a very grand appearance. Miss Kate Hanlon presided at the organ. The usual Easter collection amounted to over \$429. Owing to Father Carney being fatigued with the Easter duties there was no sermon yesterday.

At the Baptist church the services were of a specially interesting nature and attracted large congregations both morning and evening. A program of special Easter anthems was rendered by the choir, and greatly enjoyed by all. The pastor, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, took for his subject in the morning the immortality of the soul, and in the evening he spoke on the Resurrection.

The Easter services at the Cathedral yesterday were of a very appropriate and interesting character and were attended by large congregations. The decorations consisted of Easter lilies, roses and carnations, were very beautiful and greatly admired by all. His Lordship the Bishop was the preacher at the morning service, and Rev. Dean Partridge occupied the pulpit in the evening. Prof. Saunders presided at the organ, and a program of special Easter music was capably rendered by the choir.

The services at the Free Baptist church were well attended and were of a character appropriate to the occasion. The choir rendered special Easter music at both services, and in the evening there was a selection by a quartette composed of Messrs. Berry, Smith, Rigby and Tennant. At the close of the evening service six new members received the right hand of fellowship and communion was held.

Becoming a Nuisance

After partaking of a sumptuous wedding breakfast the happy and youthful couple were driven to the C. P. R. station and took passage by the nine o'clock train for their future home in Moncton.

SENATOR WARK.

Will Take His Departure for Ottawa Tomorrow Afternoon.

The veteran Senator Wark is making arrangements to leave for Ottawa by the six o'clock train tomorrow evening to take up his parliamentary duties. J. W. Hoyt, collector of customs at McAdam, an old personal friend, will accompany the Senator to the capital.

This morning Senator Wark received a telegram from Hon. R. W. Scott, Secretary of State, informing him that a private car was to be placed at his disposal, and requesting him to give the minister of railways two or three days' notice of the date of his intended departure, so that the car could be put in shape and forwarded to this city. Having already completed arrangements to leave for Ottawa tomorrow afternoon, even to engaging his Pullman berth, the aged legislator decided to decline the generous offer of the government, and wired the Secretary of State to that effect this afternoon.

A Distinguished Visitor.

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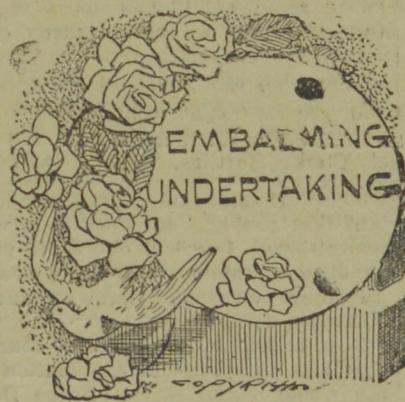
