Wild Uproar at a Tory Meeting in North Renfrew.

LIBERAL SPEAKER CALLED GAMEY BY HIS RIGHT NAME

And the Latter Responded with "You're a Liar."

Beachburg, Ont., Dec. 16.—There were several exciting scenes at a meeting held here last night in the interests of Mr. Dunlop, the Conservative candidate in North Renfrew, which was addressed by Mr. R. R. Gamey and Mr. McKay, Registrar of the High Court of Justice in Pemroke.

The latter was allowed 40 minutes to speak and his violent language was responsible for the disorder.

In referring to Gamey's trip to Buffalo, he said: "Gamey fled to Buffalo a fugitive from justice."

Mr. Gamey stepped to the front and exclaimed, "You said I was a fugitive from justice. You are a liar."

Gamey shook his fist in Mr. McKay's face, and demanded a retraction, but his words were inaudible because of the uproar in the audience.

When order was restored, Mr. McKay was heard to say: "He swore and cursed and threatened to smash my face."

Mr. Gamey denied this and another uproar followed.

TALE OF SHIPWRECK.

Deer Island Men Had Terrific Struggle for Their Lives.

Boothbay Harbor, Me., Dec. 16.—Four men who were brought to this port yesterday tell a thrilling tale of shipwreck, hardship and privation. They were Captain Taylor and three men composing the crew of the Deer Isle schooner Abbie F. Collins, which foundered in the gale that prevailed off this coast on Friday. The distressed men were brought here from Monhegan Island on the schooner Effort, Captain Humphreys.

Captain Taylor says the Collins was bound from Deer Isle to Boston with granite. On Dec. 11, about five miles south southeast of Seguin, the vessel foundered. The wind was blowing at a terrific rate and the seas were mountainous. For many hours the men were kept at work at the pumps in a vain endeavor to keep the craft above water.

When it was seen that the Collins was doomed, Captain Taylor, N. Pressy, the mate, and O. A. Libby and Thomas Robbins, the two seamen, launched a small boat.

It took the four men sixteen hours to reach shore. At times it seemed as if the frail craft would be smashed to kindling by the great waves. The seas broke over the small boat, filling it with water. The men were forced to bail continuously in order to keep the boat afloat. They were drenched to the skin and the cold weather froze their garments.

Sixteen hours after the schooner foundered the men managed to reach the shore of Monhegan Island. They were in a thoroughly exhausted condition. The residents on the island afforded them every aid and comfort possible, and they were brought to this port at the earliest opportunity.

PASTOR IN POOR HEALTH.

Probability That Rev. L. G. Macneil Will Retire.

The St. John Star says: "It is probable that Rev. Leander G. Macneil will very shortly retire from the pastorate of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, in which charge he has been for many years. Mr. Macneil has been in rather poor health for some time, and his retirement is considered advisable, both by himself and the congregation. A meeting of the officers of the church was recently held at which the subject was discussed, and on Wednesday night a congregational meeting will be held. At this the subject of Mr. Macneil's retirement will be discussed and the selection of a successor considered. It is most probable that Rev. Gordon Dickie will be tendered a call. Mr. Dickie has recently been appointed to the pastorate of a church in Cape Breton, but this could be otherwise arranged and might not necessarily prevent his accepting St. Andrew's pulpit."

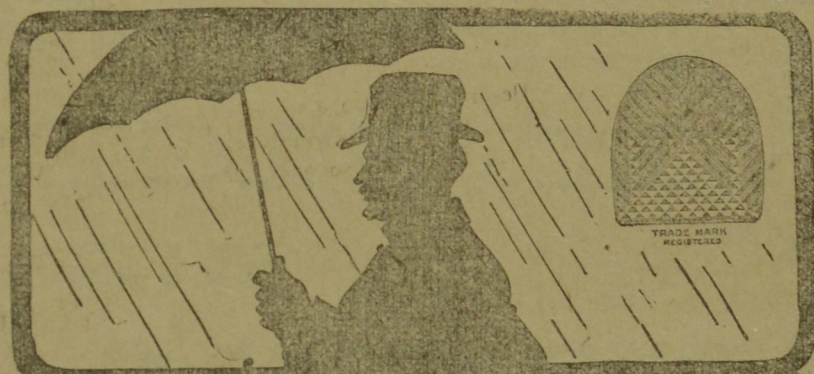
