To Discourage Lotteries.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—The Post Office Department has determined to do all in its power to prevent the circulation in the Canadian mails of correspondence relating to foreign lottery schemes, and the post offices which receive direct mails from foreign countries have accordingly received special instructions in regard to the treatment of letters, which they have reason to believe contain lottery circulars or tickets. The department has ascertained the names and addresses of a number of persons and firms in Europe and in South America, engaged in the lottery business, and postmasters are instructed not to register letters addressed to or to issue money orders payable to any of these persons or firms.

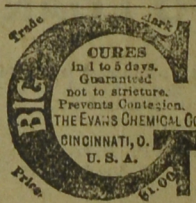
