NARROW ESCAPE

Halifax Man Working
on St. John Fire
Alarm

THROWN 25 FEET TO THE
GROUND.

No Bones Broken but
Shock Serious.

St. John, Oct. 23.—Thomas Flewing of Halifax, employed by the city in installing the new fire alarm system, came very nearly being instantly killed this morning while in the performance of his duty.

He was on a high pole at the corner of Wall street and Paradise Row, twenty five feet in the air, when the pole snapped at the ground and Flewing was thrown backwards with the heavy timber on top of him.

He was rendered unconscious and three doctors examined him. No bones were broken but the young man was badly shocked.

A New Organ.
