KING'S IRISH VISIT.

His Majesty King Edward has concluded his visit to Ireland, and its results must be satisfactory to both His Majesty and the Irish people.

He traversed the beautiful Emerald Isle, from end to end, and everywhere was received by the populace of all creeds and classes with a loyal enthusiasm that did credit to the warm hearted inhabitants. In Roman Catholic and Protestant cities, in town, village and hamlet, among the official classes, in church circles and among the humble peasantry, the king and queen received the most respectful homage, and a most flattering welcome.

His Majesty has caused it to be known since the first day he stepped on the throne that he is a friend to Ireland, and to his royal heart and hand are traceable more than one measure designed to improve the condition of that island and the happiness of its inhabitants. The Irish people are quick to perceive and appreciate a kindly disposition, and their hearty welcome to the King is not only evidence of their fealty to the crown, but also of admiration for the distinguished man on whose head the symbol of royalty so gracefully sits.

King Edward's popularity is heightened by the graciousness of his Consort who in Ireland as elsewhere won all hearts. Happy is the ruler with such an admirable wife and queen, and happy is the nation ruled by such an illustrious pair as King Edward and Queen Alexandra.

All friends of Ireland, and who is there but esteems the many admirable characteristics of the light little island and its warm hearted people, will hope that the King's visit may be productive of the best possible results. Many unhappy things have happened in Ireland; many incidents that the people of the island have themselves regretted; mistakes have been made by both rulers and governed, but let us hope that a new and happier era has dawned, and that all classes may be united in the effort, headed by the king himself, for the betterment of that section of his great empire.

THE PREMIER'S APPEARANCE.

The editor of the Halifax Chronicle who was in the press gallery of the House of Commons when Sir Wilfrid Laurier delivered his eloquent speech introducing the government's railway policy, has this to say of the premier's appearance, and Mr. McLellan's observations dispel the reports of Sir Wilfrid's ill-health.

"There was the stillness of the bush which follows prayers, when the great Liberal Leader arose simply and without theatrical trick or device of any sort to deliver his epoch-marking message to the Dominion. Sir Wilfrid presented a most impressive appearance as he stood slender, erect and calm in his accustomed place. His perfectly correct morning dress draped his graceful figure with unusual appropriateness. Could a model have been made as he addressed the Speaker and faced the House, a statue of him in bronze might have been cast which would have served as an inspiration and a pride to future generations of Canadians. He was looking not robust, of course, but vastly more clear skinned, healthy and alert than when the writer last saw him some two years ago. His speech of a little over two hours and a half in duration proved beyond the shadow of a doubt that the Prime Minister's physical powers have suffered no serious abatement. His voice was as ringing, his eye as bright, his attitude as forceful, his gesture as virile as of old. Every word that he

read or said could be heard without effort in every part of the vast and crowded auditorium. In fact, the physical demonstration which Sir Wilfrid gave to the public, was almost as gratifying to his friends as the splendid exhibition of mental and patriotic activity which it served so well to set forth."

A WAR HERO.

The memory of one of the South African war heroes, a gallant young man who gave up brilliant prospects to lay down his life for the cause of the Empire, is to be honored next month at Canning, N. S. his old home, when a handsome fountain is to be dedicated to the courageous daring, and the heroic death of Harold Borden, son of the Minister of Militia. The memorial, which is after a design by Mr. Hamilton MacCarthy, sculptor, consists of a fountain surmounted by a heroic bust of the late Lieut. Borden in uniform; on the four sides of the fountain, are inspiring representative battle pieces. The memorial stands twenty feet high, and it is expected that Lord Strathcona, Canadian High Commissioner will perform the ceremony of the unveiling. The cost of the memorial has been provided for largely by the citizens of Canning, the birthplace of Lieut. Borden.

The Sun raises the objection that no provision is made in the government railway policy for the Grand Trunk Pacific to reach St. John. The Sun's pretended fear is groundless. St. John's position must make it the chief port of shipment for freight coming over the new line from the west, and it may be taken as assured that the government will provide the means for traffic reaching that port.

Sir Thomas Lipton is not given to much boasting, but while on a flying trip to Niagara Falls Saturday, he remarked to some of his Canadian friends that after the yacht races at New York, he proposed to visit Toronto with the America cup. All admirers of the popular sporting knight on this side of the line will hope that his confidence will be justified.

The visit of the King to Ireland opened the heart and purse of at least one wealthy resident of the island, and it is announced that Lord Iveagh has donated \$250,000 to the Dublin hospitals, Protestant and Roman Catholic, in honor of the royal presence.

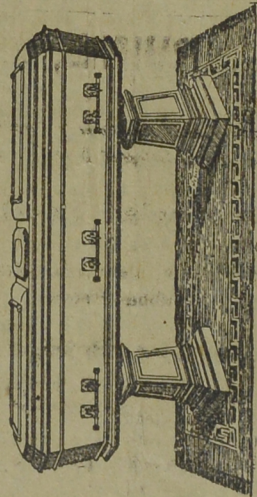
