The Constituencies Rapidly
Wheeling Into Line.

STRONG AND WINNING
GOVERNMENT TICKETS
ALL OVER

And Only a Few Vacancies
to be Filled.

The rapidity with which the Government's friends all over the province are organizing for the contest, and the excellent candidates that are being nominated in behalf of the ministry, will send cold shivers down the vertebral columns of Mr. Douglas Hazen and his friends.

In nearly every constituency government tickets are in the field and they are composed of gentlemen standing high in the counties which they aspire to represent. Only four constituencies—Northumberland, Westmorland, York and Charlotte have yet to name their men and the government phalanx will be complete all over the province.

Kent—Jas. Barnes, U. Johnson and John B. Gogain.

THE SUNBURY CONVENTION.

Splendid Attendance and Great Enthusiasm.

Harry E. Harrison of Margerville, and Dr. James Peake of Oromocto were unanimously nominated Thursday to contest Sunbury in the government interest at the approaching election, by one of the largest, most representative and enthusiastic conventions ever held in the county. Upwards of one hundred sturdy delegates were in attendance, and despite the unfavorable condition of the roads, nearly every parish in the county was represented. Isaac W. Stephenson, of Sheffield, occupied the chair. A nominating committee, appointed to select candidates reported in favor of the two gentlemen above named, and the selection was heartily ratified by the meeting. Messrs Peake and Harrison accepted the nomination in brief but telling speeches. Other addresses were delivered by E. H. McAlpine, K. C., Ex-Councillor Grass and Arthur Glasier, ex-M. P. P. The last named gentleman, who was until lately one of Mr. Hazen's strongest supporters in the county, came out flat footed in favor of the government candidates, and was accorded a most cordial reception. The meeting broke up with hearty cheers for the King and government candidates. Good old Sunbury will do its duty by the government on the 28th.

Notes and Incidents.

The Charlotte Liberal convention refused to ratify the compromise agreement between the party leaders, that two representatives from each party be elected by acclamation, and is meeting again this afternoon. The Tory convention voted in favor of the agreement and nominated W. C. H. Grimmer and Geo. J. Clarke.

Premier Tweedie attended the Carleton government convention, Thursday, and was given a rousing reception. In his address he particularly referred to the charge that he was not a Liberal. The Conservatives had read him out of the party some years ago at the time of the Moncton convention, and if had not gone to the Liberal party he would have been an Ishmaelite. He was a member in good standing in the Liberal party.

Hon. A. G. Blair, who was to have spoken at St. John this evening, is delayed at Ottawa by public business, but will keep his engagement in St. John Monday evening and

will be accompanied by Hon. D. C. Fraser, M. P. for Guysboro.

Daniel Mullin has decided not to contest St. John city, and says he will take no part in the campaign.

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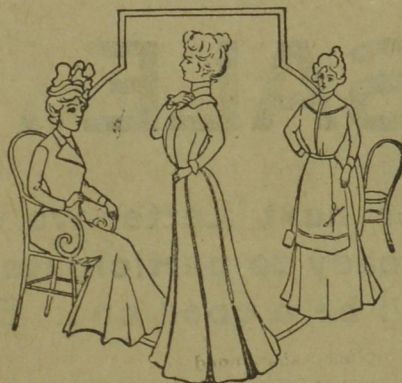
