A STRONG TICKET.

The convention of the government's friends in York this afternoon was a splendid representation, an enthusiastic, successful gathering of earnest men who promptly disposed of their work in a highly satisfactory manner, and their action is the prelude to a rattling victory at the polls for the candidates of their choice.

The government standard bearers in York are all gentlemen most favorably known throughout the constituency, and form a combination that is a credit to the county and to the party that has put them in nomination. They are all natives of this county and are clean, respectable and respected men, and will worthily represent York in the legislature.

Mr. W. T. Whitehead who has sat in the Assembly for the past four years, is easily one of the most popular and esteemed residents of this constituency. He has been a success in everything he has undertaken. A keen business man, a gentleman of irreproachable reputation, a big hearted, public spirited citizen, Mr. Whitehead enjoys the confidence of every man in the county whose regard is worth possessing. He has served Fredericton in the mayoralty, and York in the legislature, and in both positions discharged his duty with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of the people. Four years ago the electors of York sent Mr. Whitehead to the legislature by an enormous majority, and the careful manner in which he has looked after the interests of the constituency is known of all men.

Mr. John A. Campbell has also had four years experience in the legislature, and is well deserving re-election. One of the leading intelligent farmers of York, he has brought to bear on questions before the legislature a ripe experience and a fair judgment, and has proved his worth as a representative. Mr. Campbell is esteemed as a gentleman of excellent character and honest purposes, and properly stands high in the confidence and respect of the electors.

Mr. George W. Allen, K. C., is known as an able lawyer, one of the cleverest men at the New Brunswick bar, an honorable man in private and public life, a worthy scion of a family that for nearly a century has occupied positions of trust and honor in this county. In the House Mr. Allen has been accorded a leading place as a careful legislator, one who gives the most assiduous attentions to his duties, and is entrusted with much of the responsibility pertaining to the drafting and passage of the laws of the country, and his absence from that body would be almost a calamity.

Mr. Geo. F. Burden, the new man on the ticket, is actively identified with the great lumbering industry of the county, and is a capable and respected member of the municipal council. He is young, energetic, intelligent, enjoys an excellent

personal reputation, and is considered a very important addition to the government ticket.

With these four gentlemen carrying the government standard in the present campaign, the friends of the administration feel every confidence that they will achieve a notable victory at the polls on Feb. 28.

THE DEAL REPUDIATED.

The attempt of a few self constituted leaders of the Liberal and Conservative parties in Charlotte to make, bargain and sale of that constituency's representation in the legislature, has been repudiated by sturdy Liberals of the county, and their action deserves the warm commendation of every honorable man. Better far for the government to lose the entire representation of the constituency than to sanction any such deal.

Premier Tweedie, to his honor be it said, has expressed himself strongly against the bargain, and was present at the meeting of the government's friends which repudiated the job, the premier intimating that unless his colleague, who was a party to the deal shook himself clear of it, he would be asked to resign his seat in the government.

The government party in the county, besides repudiating the bargain, promptly put up a full ticket, and will prosecute what promises to be a successful campaign.

The parties who sought to fasten the reprehensible deal on the county, must be heartily ashamed of their work, and the valiant men who sat on the attempted compromise and threw it overboard are to be congratulated for the courage with which they faced and successfully grappled with a delicate situation.

A report from opposition sources says that Mr. Hill has resigned his seat in the government, and that he will run as an opposition candidate. Our St. Stephen despatch, however, contradicts the last assertion, and a telegram from the Premier says that Mr. Hill has not resigned.

CAMPAIGN NOTES.

The Carleton opposition have chosen J. Chip. Hartley, J. K. Fleming and Frank Smith as their candidates for the legislature.

Westmorland Liberal convention met yesterday at Moncton, but adjourned till Monday on account of a railway accident that prevented delegates from the eastern parishes from being present. There was an attendance of over 300 delegates and great enthusiasm. A resolution was unanimously passed approving of the support given the local government by Messrs. Robinson and Copp, and pledging support to the candidates to be chosen in opposition to Mr. Hazen and his party. Three of the candidates will be Mr. Robinson, Mr. Copp, and Dr. Gaudet, and the choice for fourth man is said to be between Conn. Fred Magee and F. J. Sweeney.

Premier Tweedie is to speak at Hillsboro this evening, and will be at Chatham Monday to open his campaign in Northumberland. His colleagues, Messrs. Barchill, O'Brien and Fieh, are already on the stump and have addressed meetings at Boiestown and Doaktown.

Fred W. Sumner, ex-M.P.P., did not attend the Westmorland opposition convention, but has wired an offer of nomination and declined.

There are two tickets in the field in Gloucester, both favorable to the government. The old members, Burns, Young and Poirier, form one combination, and Curran, Marris and Bondreau the other.

After a diligent search of several weeks Mr. Hazen has discovered four opposition candidates for York, and the government's friends welcome the appearance of the quartette. A weaker combination than Plnder, Young, Robison and McLeod could scarcely be scraped together, and they will be buried on the 28th. None of them have elements of strength that will count with the electors,

and they form but a mere makeshift combination to prevent the election of the government candidates by acclamation.

The Sun represents the government candidates in Sunbury as "only figure-heads" and yet one of the gentlemen thus referred to came within seven votes of defeating Mr. Hazen in the last election. The Sun should drop its campaign of bluff and deceit.
