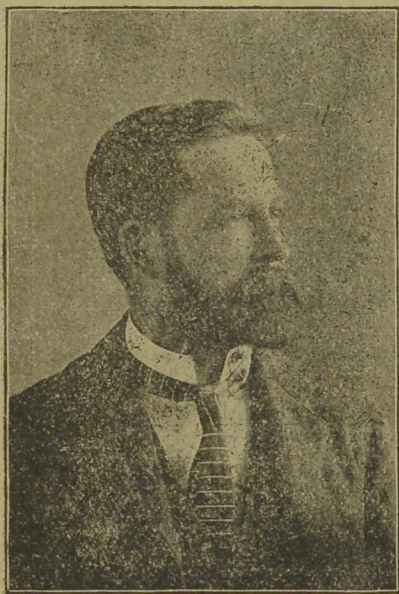
Whithead, Campbell, Allen

A ROUSING NOMINATING CONVENTION
UNANIMOUS IN ITS SELECTION
OF CANDIDATES.

The convention of supporters of the local government in the Y. M. C. A. hall this afternoon was one of the largest and most representative ever held in the county and augurs well for victory on the 28th. Although the roads are very heavy in the county districts the sturdy electors of York responded nobly to the party call, several of the delegates having driven over forty miles to be present and attest their hearty sympathy for the cause of good government. Nearly every parish in the county was represented in the gathering of over two hundred delegates which Conn. Rowley called to order at 2.30 o'clock, and there was an air of hopefulness, enthusiasm and determination about the place which showed more plainly than words that the four men selected by the convention will be York's next representatives.

The announcement was greeted with great enthusiasm, and on motion of Alex. Gibson, M. P. seconded by Senator Thompson, was made unanimous by a standing vote, and the candidates were afterwards given three cheers and a tiger.

speeches were made by Senator Thompson, J. D. Phinney, K. C., and John Anderson, ex-M.P.P.

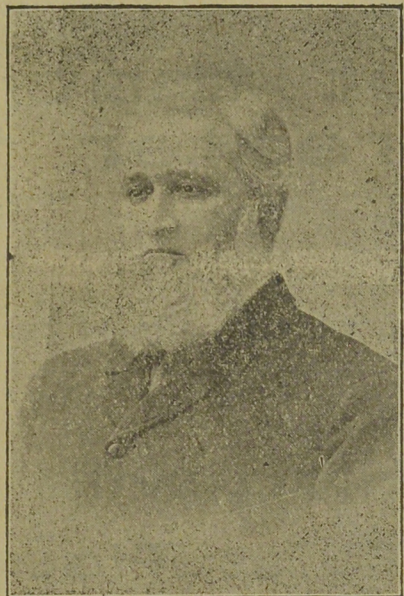

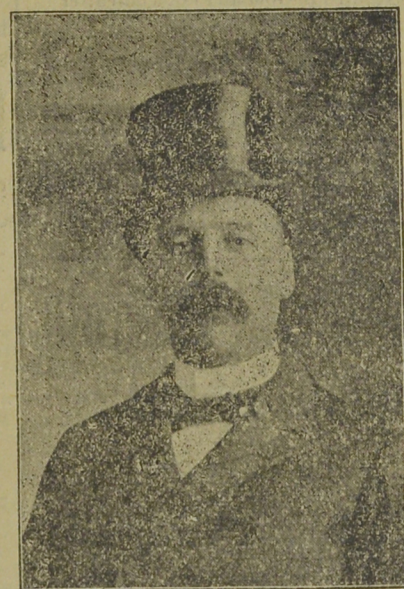

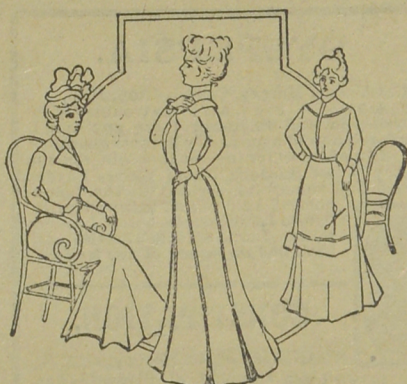
