The Irish Curse.

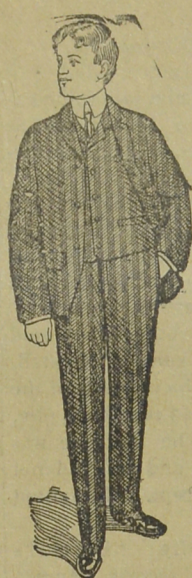

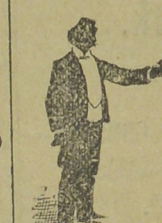
