

THE TIGER WON.

Tammany's Great Victory in New York.

McLELLAN ELECTED MAYOR BY AN ENORMOUS PLURALITY.

New York, Nov. 3.—After a remarkable campaign in which there was united against him nearly all of the newspapers and practically every clergyman in the city, George B. McClellan, son of the Civil War general, was today elected third mayor of Greater New York over Seth Low, Fusion candidate, the present mayor, by a large plurality of about 70,000.

A surprise was the small vote for Wm. S. Devery, former chief of police, who ran on an independent ticket, and was given practically no support.

This result shows a tremendous change of public sentiment since Mayor Low's election two years ago when he won by 31,632. At that time he carried all the boroughs but Queens, his plurality in Manhattan and the Bronx being 5,663, in Brooklyn 26,767, and in Richmond 763. In Queens, Shepard (Dem.) had a plurality of 561.

Today McClellan carried Manhattan and the Bronx by about 58,000 a gain of 63,000; Brooklyn by about 6,000 a gain of 31,000, and Queens by about 5,000, a gain of more than 4,000. This makes a total net gain for McClellan of about 103,000 as compared with Shepard's vote of two years ago.

Low carried only one borough—Richmond—by about 200 votes.

From the fall of darkness till long after midnight the Tenderloin was the scene of noisy revel. The vigorous hum which commenced at the first few bulletins appeared soon grew into the most tremendous human demonstration of delirious joy that the Tenderloin or the city itself has probably ever seen.

From the flatiron building to Long Acre square, 100,000 people surged back and forth from one bulletin board to another. On Broadway and parts of Fifth, Sixth and Seventh avenues the noise later became a roar that sounded like the crash of many batteries of artillery. In spite of the immense numbers the crowd was remarkably good natured and the arrests were very few. More than 900 policemen were distributed through the districts where the people were the most numerous.

Later Returns.

New York, Nov. 4.—1260 election districts out of 1535 in Greater New York for Mayor gave Low 195,822, McClellan 250,279 and Devery 2,404.

McClellan's plurality in the city of New York is 61,414.

The canal referendum carried, and the Republicans have increased their majority in the New York state assembly.

Bates carried Massachusetts for governor by nearly 36,000.

New York, Nov. 4.—The Herald says: "Tammany's triumph, it was said on the highest authority last night, will result in sending a delegation from New York to the Democratic National convention, pledged to Grover Cleveland."

A Voice from the North.

President Hazen after paying an eloquent tribute to Judge Wilkison, called upon that gentleman to address the gathering. The veteran judge responded in a most feeling address, which was well received by the company. He was sorry to learn that Judge Stevens had ceased to be a county court judge. He certainly had done his duty in the position which he had so long adorned, and the bar of New Brunswick was deeply indebted to him.

Brief speeches were also made in response to this toast by Judges Landry, McLeod and Gregory.

The Veterans.

Recorder Skidner in a witty and vigorous speech proposed "the Veterans of the New Brunswick bar," a toast which was greeted with great acclaim.

The veteran police Magistrate Marsh was the first to respond and got a very cordial reception. He returned thanks to the Barristers' Society for their kind invitation to be present, and assisting in honoring the learned Chief Justice. He had known the Chief when in Fredericton as a student, and had watched his career at the bar and on the bench, and felt that it was one which shed lustre on the province of New Brunswick. He (Marsh) was senior to the Chief Justice by six months, and had for 32 years presided over one of the inferior courts of the province.

Hon George F. Hill M. P. P. also spoke briefly in response to the toast, and was warmly applauded.

Dr. Stockton Heard From.

The attorney general in a few well chosen words proposed the health of Dr. A. A. Stockton, and remarked that he felt sure all were pleased to see him present and restored to health.

The toast was drunk with great vim and Dr. Stockton made a felicitous reply. He had known the Chief Justice since 1864 and had always held him in the greatest esteem. He (Stockton) might be looked upon as one of the veterans of the bar, were it not for the fact that when he began the study of law thirty years ago, his friend Skinner was solicitor general of New Brunswick, and his friend Hill, who always spoke against the government and voted for it (great laughter) was a member of the House of Assembly. In the light of these facts it was not easy for him to look upon himself as a veteran. When he (Stockton) first came to Fredericton he thought the St. John river the most beautiful on earth, and he thought so still. He also thought Fredericton the prettiest little city in the world, and had not changed his opinion since then. The learned doctor in conclusion spoke of the great advantages within the reach of members of the legal profession, and gave some good advice to the young men present.

The health of Dr. Silas Alward, was proposed by Judge McLeod and that youthful and dashing gentleman made a most happy and fitting acknowledgment. He dwelt upon the greatness of Canada, and expressed the opinion that the Chief Justice and all of them had been born fifty years too soon, to be able to share the noble heritage which belongs to Canadians.

Mr. E. B. Winslow, K. C., also responded to this toast in a speech which was a revelation to his friends. He paid a glowing tribute to the worth of the Chief Justice, whose acquaintance he had enjoyed for many years.

A toast to the members of the bar by President Hazen brought forth an eloquent and scholarly deliverance from H. A. Powell ex-M. P. He spoke of the great men that had been given to public life by these provinces by the sea referring especially to Joseph Howe and the late Governor Wilnot. He believed that it was only because they played their part in a small arena that the world did not recognize their greatness. He was proud of the noble profession of the law, and regretted that he had been dragged into politics and thus prevented from giving his exclusive time to his profession.

Brief speeches were also made by Messrs. McAllister, Carvell and J. M. Stevens.

Judge Hanington proposed the health of the Barrister's society, and in doing so took occasion to dissent from the view expressed by Mr. Powell in regard to politics. He (the judge) was not sorry that he had engaged in politics.

The toast was briefly responded to by Mr. Hazen, after which the singing of Auld Lang Syne and God Save the King brought to a close one of the most enjoyable banquets ever held in this province.

Hanon's orchestra, from a position in the hallway, enlivened the proceedings with an excellent program of music.

STEEL IN HER HEART.

A Remarkable Discovery During an Autopsy.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Nov. 2.—Physicians of Niagara Falls are mystified by a remarkable discovery made during an autopsy on the body of Mrs. Mary E. Halliday, who died suddenly. She was seized with a strange attack, and a doctor relieved her by administering stimulants. When the doctor had departed she grew worse and soon died. Coroner Slocum directed that an autopsy be performed. Two pieces of corset steel were found in her heart, their total length being eight and three quarter inches. Where they rubbed together the ends were worn to a razor edge by the movement of her body. There is no information as to how or when the steel entered her body. None of Mrs. Halliday's relatives ever heard her complain of an accident of that kind. The doctors say it may have been swallowed and worked its way from the intestines to the heart, or might have penetrated the skin and worked around until found. She was forty two years old, and the mother of six children. She suffered greatly and at times was confined to her bed, but rheumatism was her supposed ailment.

He is at present negotiating with the C. P. R. All Line for accommodation, and a cabin is being reserved for him.

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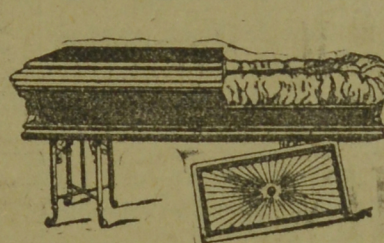
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
