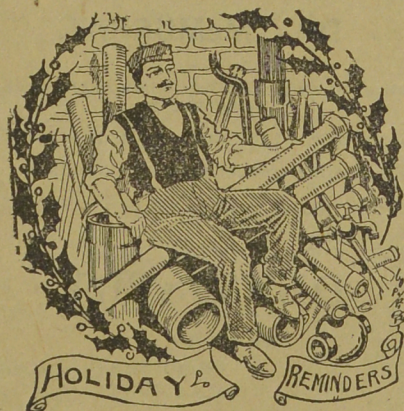
LADIES BEAT THEM.

WELCOME HOME.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Returns to Ottawa With Health Restored.

SAYS HE IS GLAD TO BE BACK TO CANADA.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived at 8 o'clock last night and got a hearty and enthusiastic welcome.

Among those present were Hon. W. S. Fielding, Hon. A. G. Blair, Hon. R. W. Scott, Sir Frederick Borden, Sir William Mulock, Hon. William Patterson, Hon. James Sutherland, Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Hon. Charles Fitzpatrick, Mr. Belcourt, M. P., as well as leading citizens of Ottawa, irrespective of political creed.

Sir Wilfrid spoke a few minutes, going among the crowd shaking hands, and afterwards drove to his residence on Theodore street.

Everyone remarked how well the premier looked. He has put on flesh during his holiday in the south, and is in better health now than he has been for the past two or three years.

Speaking to a press representative, Sir Wilfrid said that he was feeling well and ready to start work. His trip has completely restored him. Indeed, it was apparent to all who saw him looking so bright and cheerful that this was the case.

As Sir Wilfrid was stepping into his carriage, a telegraph boy placed a despatch in his hand, announcing that Premier Ross had carried all three constituencies in Ontario.

Montreal, Jan. 8.—"Well, I am glad to see you and pleased to be home again. What news have you and how are all the friends?" This was the greeting extended to the group of political and personal friends who went to the Bonaventure station to welcome the prime minister yesterday afternoon.

The train bearing Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier reached Bonaventure soon after 4 p. m., the prime minister giving a hearty shake of the hand to all who entered the private car, which had been placed at the disposition of the party during their sojourn in the U. S. All were interested in the premier's health, and satisfaction was expressed when it was seen that the Liberal leader was alert and vigorous and that he had regained his wonted strength. Premier Laurier said he was ready to go to work again.

Sir Wilfrid described the beauties of the southern clime, "but after all," he added, "give me Canada."

Lady Laurier, who appears in excellent health also expressed the pleasure she felt in reaching home.

Within a short time after the train reached Bonaventure the prime minister's car was attached to the Canada Atlantic express, which was soon speeding toward the capital.

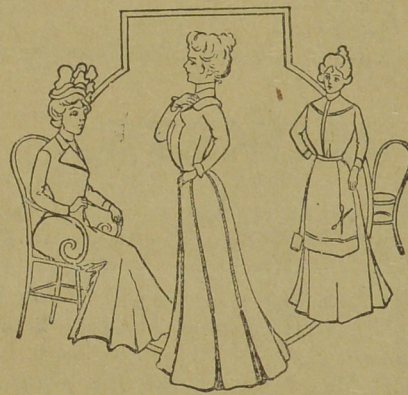
