

JUMPED HIS BAIL

Wesley Kinney, Indicted
by the Grand Jury
for Rape,

FAILS TO APPEAR IN
COURT TO STAND
TRIAL

And His Bondsmen Called
Upon to Pay up.

ATTORNEY GENERAL PUGSLEY HAS
FURTHER WORK FOR THE GRAND
JURY TO DO.

Wesley Kinney, North Lake, who was indicted by the grand jury on Tuesday on a charge of committing rape on a girl named Lydia Jane McNally, failed to put in an appearance for trial at the circuit court this morning, and therefore forfeits his bail.

Shortly after court opened the attorney general, who appeared for the crown, moved for trial in the case of the King vs. Wesley Kinney. R. W. McLellan, who appeared for the accused, stated that his client had not yet arrived in the city, but a telegram received by him from Allan Markee, of North Lake, stated that Kinney would arrive today if possible. He added that he expected his client on the noon train.

The prisoner's name being called three times, and he not appearing, His Honor, on motion of the attorney general, declared the recognizance to be estreated.

The prisoner is held in his own recognizance in the sum of \$500, and his father, Austin Kinney and William Gaston, of North Lake are down as sureties in the sum of \$250 each.

On motion of the Attorney General the Judge ordered a bench warrant to issue for the arrest of Kinney.

The members of the grand jury, who were held at the request of the attorney general, put in an appearance in court at eleven o'clock this morning and were briefly addressed by His Honor. He said that the nature of the business to be brought before them had been communicated to him by the attorney general, and it was such that he felt that he was not in a position to take part in it. He had wired a request to Judge McLeod to come up and take the case, but as yet had received no reply. At any rate, he believed there would be a delay of ten days before anything was done, and he would therefore ask the grand jury to separate to meet again at the call of the Sheriff.

After the grand jury had retired, the civic cases entered on the docket were then up. The case of David Lipsett vs. Dill McKnight, an action for trespass, was made a non-jury case at the request of H. F. McLeod, counsel for the defendant, and the trial was postponed until later in the term.

In the Edgcombe cases, His Honor strongly advised that they be referred to arbitration, and it is likely that his advice will be accepted.

The case of Crosby vs. T. G. Loggie and E. B. Winslow was set down for trial on Tuesday next.

When the court resumed this afternoon, His Honor dismissed the twenty additional jurymen from further attendance until Friday, Jan. 16th, when, it was announced by him, that Judge McLeod will take over the circuit.

Kinney, not putting in an appearance, as partially promised by his counsel, his bail was ordered to be estreated, and the sheriff was instructed to take steps to apprehend him.

At 2 45 p.m. the court adjourned until Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

DEFEATED AT MONCTON.

A CLEAN SWEEP.

Ontario Liberals Carry
All Three Bye-
Elections.

ROSS GOVERNMENT HAS
NOW A SUBSTANTIAL
MAJORITY.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The Ontario government won a decisive victory in the bye-elections yesterday.

In North Grey, A. G. Mackay, Liberal, defeated G. M. Boyd, Conservative, by 150 majority, with one place to hear from.

In North Perth election, John Brown, Liberal, defeated J. F. Monteith, Conservative, by 240, with one place to hear from.

In North Norfolk, S. M. Little, Liberal, won out in a hot contest from Doctor Snider, by 55 majority. In the last general election in North Norfolk, Snider had 27 majority over E. C. Carpenter, former Liberal member.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—There is much jubilation among the Liberals here over the result of the local bye-elections in Ontario, the Liberals carrying the three seats. In North Perth, Brown (Liberal) was elected by about 200; in North Grey, Mackay (Liberal) by 245, and in North Norfolk, Little (Liberal) by nearly 100.

North Norfolk and North Perth were carried by Conservatives in the general election last May and North Grey, by Liberals.
