After reading the letter, Bellefontaine proceeded to the rear end of the train, and without a word to anyone jumped off. The express was running pretty fast at the time, but it was brought to a standstill as quickly as possible. It was then backed up and a careful search was made for the man whose strange action caused a sensation; no trace of him, however, could be found, and as the train could not be longer delayed, one of the trainmen was left behind to endeavor to find the missing man, who had evidently not been much injured. No report of Bellefontaine's whereabouts had been received up to late last night.

An Attempted Suicide.

Buffalo, Sept. 23.—Reed Northrup, a wealthy St. Louis business man, connected with one of the fast freight refrigerating lines, attempted to commit suicide yesterday by shooting himself. The bullet, however, merely inflicted a superficial wound in the scalp. Northrup, with his wife, who is in bad health and two children, has been staying at the Niagara Hotel for two weeks. Worrying over his wife's health, which prevented his returning to St. Louis, where he had important business engagements, is attributed as the cause of his attempt to take his life. His brother committed suicide at St. Louis last June.
