In the Hands of Montreal Police.

OVER A HUNDRED GATHERED IN BY THIS MORNING'S RAID.

White Women too Among the Arrests.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Montreal, Oct. 20.—The police made a sensational raid on the Chinese quarters early this morning with the result that 107 arrests were made, ten being white women and the balance Chinamen.

Three houses were raided and there was great excitement in the district when platoons of police and patrol wagons appeared and commenced to cart the prisoners away.

The Chinaman as usual on occasions of this kind, were panic stricken, and made ineffectual attempts to evade the officers, but the arrangements had been too well planned to give them an opportunity to escape.

The prisoners appeared in court today and pleaded not guilty and were remanded.

LABOR DELEGATION.

Interviewed Laurier and Mulock—Well Received.

Ottawa, Oct. 20.—A deputation from the National Trades and Labor Congress waited upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir William Mulock, minister of labor, this morning, and submitted to them an address embodying the resolutions passed by the congress in Quebec in September last.

Sir William Mulock replied briefly, assuring the deputation that their representations would be favorably considered by the government.

CARPENTERS STRIKE

And Some Contractors Concede Demands.

Winnipeg, Oct. 20.—About 45 carpenters went on strike today, demanding 33 cents per hour for a nine hour day, instead of the sliding scale of 25 to 40 cents per hour which rules. Thirty-five out of the eighty contractors in the city have granted the demands of the carpenters, thus avoiding a strike. It is expected the others will follow in a few days. Agreements are for one year.

Business in the carpenter line is very brisk and contractors are at the mercy of the men.

PAYING THE CLAIMS.

Depositors of Elgin Loan Co. Receiving Substantial Dividends.

London, Ont., Oct. 20.—The London and Western Trust Co., liquidators of the Elgin Loan Co. of St. Thomas, yesterday forwarded to St. Thomas a cheque for \$150,000 for payment to the Elgin Loan depositors.

This, with \$75,000 paid on August 30, will give the depositors 75 per cent. of their claims, and it is expected that the remaining 25 per cent. will be paid before long. It is now likely that the shareholders also will get something.
