FIRST CLASS ROAD.

The Herald does not yet despair that the Grand Trunk Pacific railway will be routed through Fredericton. When the government engineers come to New Brunswick to make a survey, they will not be long in discovering that the valley of the St. John offers the most feasible route through this province, and that whatever distance might be saved by a direct route through the centre of New Brunswick will be more than counterbalanced by the difficult gradients of that region. Before the construction of the eastern section of the Grand Trunk Pacific is undertaken, Fredericton will have railway connection with Chipman, so that this line can be utilized by the government as part of the main line to Moncton.

In view of the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific through New Brunswick, it should be very satisfactory to the people of Fredericton, says the St. John Gazette, that The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company is building such a thoroughly first-class road between Chipman and the capital. We learn that the provincial government engineer, who recently examined the line as far as constructed, reports that it is in every way superior to the branch lines which have been built in the province in the past. It is well adapted for becoming part of the trunk line, and will no doubt be utilized by The Grand Trunk Pacific. The provincial government has acted wisely in providing in its specifications for a first class line, and in insisting that the specifications will be carried to the letter.

PERILS OF RIVER TRAVEL.

The dangers of river navigation were again illustrated yesterday when the Crystal Stream, a steamer plying on the Kennebecasis, struck a snag when off Rothesay, knocking a hole her bottom through which the water flowed freely. The boat had 150 passengers on board, an excursion in honor of the Chamber of Commerce delegates, but the fact that the boat had struck was kept from them and a dash was made for Indian town, the pumps keeping the water down. At one time however there was danger of the engine fire being extinguished, and if that had happened the results might have been serious.

The case is one which demands a searching investigation. There is plenty of water in the Kennebecasis channel to float a much larger steamer than the Crystal Stream, and it must have been gross carelessness that permitted the boat to strike. People will seriously think of abandoning river travel unless they can feel certain that the Weston and yesterday's incidents will not be repeated.

Mr. Blair declares that if the public credits the Telegraph's utterances on the railway question to him, it will do him a great injustice. Mr. Blair expressed his sentiments on the question in parliament, in a manly, straightforward way. Everybody knows where he is on the subject, but he very wisely declines to be held responsible for the Telegraph's hysterics.

Mr. David Russell who controls the Telegraph from his room in the Windsor hotel, Montreal, may be a very successful promoter and an estimable young man, but the Liberals of New Brunswick are not taking their political views from so unstable a guide.

The Edmundston Times in remarking on the prosperity of that village, says new buildings are going up in all directions. The growth and prosperity of Edmundston and Madawaska have been marked during the past few years, and there is evidently a promising future in store for them. The Madawaska farmers are rapidly adapting themselves to new agricultural methods, and their prosperity is largely contributing to Edmundston's growth. As an important point on the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, Edmundston is bound to receive a great impetus from the construction of the new road.

At least five former New Brunswickers are candidates for the British Columbia legislature, the elections for which occur on Saturday next. They are Dr. Brydson Jack, Vancouver, formerly of Fredericton, J. R. Garden, Vancouver, formerly of Woodstock, W. J. Bowser, Vancouver, former Kent county resident, Sydney S. Taylor, a native of King county, nephew of the late C. A. Stockton, barrister of St. John, and Dr. J. H. King, Cranbrook, son of Senator King of Chipman. Garden and Bowser are Conservatives and Taylor, Jack and King are Liberals.

The managers of the Fredericton Exhibition may well feel satisfied with the results of their efforts when they receive warm commendation from the pulpit as well as the press. To Rev. Dean Partridge's kind words of praise published exclusively in yesterday's Herald, are added today the appreciative observations of Rev. Father Carney. At the Baptist church Sunday evening, Rev. J. H. Macdonald also had good words to say of the exhibition and its management.

A St. John newspaper which derives a large measure of support from this city, devotes nearly two columns to the opening of a county exhibition at Sussex, whereas to the provincial exhibition held in this city last week the same paper gave a few inches each day. People are wondering why such a distinction is made against Fredericton.

Moncton has a variety of entertainments this week, something to suit the taste of all its citizens. A Methodist missionary society convention, horse races, educational institute meeting and the visit of the Coldstream Guard's band are among the attractions of the railway hub between this and Saturday.

The Nova Scotia militia are very proud of their new drill ground and rifle range which are located two miles from the town of Kentville. The former is some seven hundred acres in extent, and is admirably adapted for its purpose, Lord Dunsford pronouncing it the finest in Canada.

Liberal electors of St. Mary's division, Montreal, held a meeting last night at which it was resolved to ask Mr. Tarte for his resignation as a member of parliament.

They also succeeded in recovering possession of the horse.

Only a few days ago Morrell broke into Mr. Bridges' residence and stole a gold watch. He afterwards made a confession of the theft and restored the watch to its owner. He pleaded so hard to be given a chance that Mr. Bridges decided not to prosecute him. He afterwards

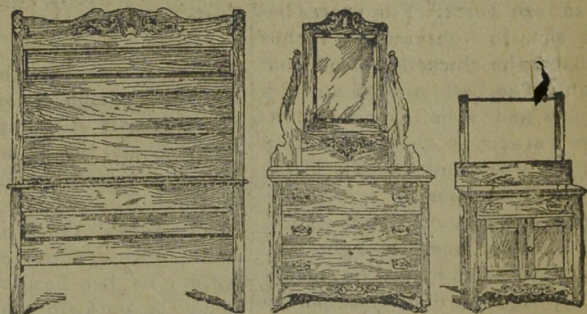
