Johnson, a sister of the lady above referred to won first prize for the best sample of embroidery, and Miss Alice Good of Kingarth was awarded first prize for the best bedroom slippers, and first for the best white wool shawl.

THE MUNICIPAL CONTEST.

A Stiff Fight Being Put up in a Number of Parishes.

The municipal contest promises to be a warm one in several of the parishes of the county, and it would not be a matter of surprise if several members of the present council are left at home by the electors on the 6th prox. to attend to their private affairs. In the Parish of Douglas Ex-councillor Seymour is after the scalp of Councillor McFarlane, and is making a strong canvass on behalf of Asa Currie, the opposition candidate. He has issued a circular to the electors in which he accuses Coun. McFarlane of being largely responsible for the expenditure of \$469.44, incurred in fighting the smallpox bills of the Board of Health. Couns. McFarlane and Etoy will hold public meetings throughout the parish from now until the close of the campaign.

This evening they are to hold forth at Royal Road and tomorrow evening they speak in the hall at Nashwaakasis. Ex-Coun. Seymour will take a hand in the proceedings and the indications are that there will be "wits on the green."

The old councillors, John C. Murray and A. E. Cliff are being opposed in Kingsclear by B. W. Fox, who was an unsuccessful candidate for municipal honors two years ago.

In Southampton James T. Masten and William Haines are out against the old candidates, and are making a vigorous canvass.

In St. Marys Coun. Rowley has retired, much to the regret of the people of the parish, and the candidates are Coun. R. L. Young of Nashwaak, Clarence N. G. Olespeed and Charles Forbes of Penniac and Charles B. Morgan of St. Marys.

In the Parish of Canterbury, Alfred B. Wright is reported to be in the field, in opposition to Warden Grosvenor and Coun. Carr.

Couns. Thos. Robison and Robert Thompson, of Manners Sutton, were returned by acclamation.

Y. M. C. A. SECRETARY.

Mr. Ley Coming Here from St. Thomas Which Loses Him with Regret.

The Fredericton Y. M. C. A. has secured the services of Mr. E. H. Ley, of St. Thomas, Ont., as secretary and director of physical culture, and judging by the sincerity of the leave taking which the people of the latter city extended to Mr. Ley, his services as assistant secretary of the St. Thomas association, were highly appreciated, as well as his worth as a citizen and a man.

Previous to his departure at a social gathering of the Y. M. C. A., the president, Mr. Olmstead, presented Mr. Ley with a beautiful gold watch and chain, and there was a round of addresses wishing him success in his new field of labor.

Mr. Ley was also a valued member of the Central Methodist church choir at St. Thomas, and from his fellow members he received a dress suit case, and from the Sunday school a present in books. He will spend a short time at Toronto studying Y. M. C. A. methods, and is expected here to take up his duties about the middle of October.

Serious Accident.

Rev. David Russell of London, who filled the Baptist pulpit here during Rev. J. H. Macdonald's vacation this summer, met with a severe accident on the passage to England. Four days out from Montreal the str. Lake Simcoe encountered a bad storm. During a heavy roll of the steamer Mr. Russell was thrown in the smoking room and had one of his legs broken at the thigh. On reaching Liverpool he entered a hospital.

A Child's Death.

The death occurred at Doak Settlement yesterday of Frederick Vincent, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Doherty, of that place, aged two years and ten months. His death was due to an attack of pneumonia. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon with interment at Forest Hill. John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

U. N. B. SENATE.

Special Meeting Held at the Education Office.

DR. DAVIDSON'S HEALTH IS NOT IMPROVED.

Work on the Gymnasium Not to Commence This Year.

A special meeting of the University Senate was held in the education office this morning, those present being Dr. J. R. Inch, Chancellor, Harrison, Judge Barker, William Brodie, Judge McLeod, Inspector Bridges, J. D. Hazen, M. P. P., Secretary Scott and the bursar, Prof. Jack.

The meeting was called to deal with a communication from Dr. John Davidson a member of the faculty at present on leave of absence in the old country for the benefit of his health. The doctor stated in the communication that his health had not improved, and he certainly would be unable to resume his duties for some time to come. The communication also dealt with a matter of a personal nature which the members of the senate think would not be in good taste to make public. The communication was briefly discussed and was finally referred to the president for a reply.

The gymnasium committee reported that at the present time there was \$2500 available towards the cost of a new gymnasium building, but as the amount is insufficient it was decided to postpone building operations until next spring.

At a previous meeting of the senate it was decided to increase the tuition fees for engineering students from \$30 to \$50 per year, but as notice of the proposed change, was through an oversight, omitted from the college calendar, it was decided that the increase would not be made until the beginning of the next academic year. The tuition fee for engineering students are at present lower than prevails at any other Canadian college, and the Senate feel that in view of the large expenditure made in improving the facilities for an engineering course, they are justified in making an increase.

An appeal from the holder of the St. Andrew's scholarship to be relieved from tuition fees was referred to a special committee of the senate, with power to act.

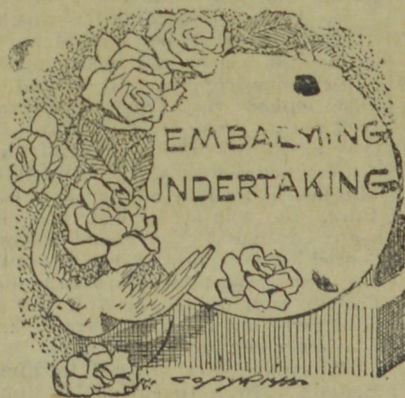
