ILL-MANNERED SNEERS.

Some of the Tory newspapers of the more vicious class sneer at the Toronto Globe because its editor is a clergyman, and frequently refers to the great Liberal organ as "the Rev. Globe." This is in exceedingly bad taste. Rev. J. A. Macdonald is proving himself a very clever editor, superior in the opinion of many to any of his predecessors. Those who criticize Mr. Macdonald for engaging in secular work forget the fact that he exercises a greater influence for good in the editorial columns of the Globe than if he were able to thunder from half a dozen pulpits. In our own province a good many years ago, Rev. William Elder forsook the pulpit to own and edit the St. John Telegraph, and he was thereby able to carry his good influence into a far wider sphere than if he had remained a preacher.

This is not intended as an argument that all preachers or any great number of them should cast aside their clerical robes and enter the journalistic profession; for not all of them or perhaps any considerable number of them are qualified to edit a newspaper, but there is no sense in sneering at any clergyman, who instead of following his profession, finds that his duty lies in editing a clean, healthy, vigorous newspaper. The press is acknowledged as an engine of mighty influence, and the more true hearted, clean living, God-fearing clergymen, or other men of that character, it has in its staff, the more likely it is to exercise a good influence, and lift the profession to a higher plane.

"The Rev. Globe" is all right, and its reverend editor is able to hold his own in any controversy, political or otherwise that may arise within his sphere or elsewhere.

AN EXAMPLE TO N. B.

Sir Oliver Mowatt has been dead only a few weeks, yet the Ontario government has already taken steps to erect a \$10,000 monument to his memory.

We move more slowly with such matters in the maritime provinces. Hon. Joseph Howe, the able Nova Scotian ever raised and the father of responsible government in that province, has been dead more than thirty years, but no statue has been raised to perpetuate his memory. However, the money for such purpose was voted at the last session of the Nova Scotia legislature and the monument will soon be erected. In this province nothing has been done to honor the memory of Wilmot and Fisher, the men who gave New Brunswick responsible government, and the neglect reflects no credit on us. Howe and Wilmot and Fisher did greater work for their province, and some of them at least were abler men with wider reputations than Sir Oliver Mowatt, whose memory is to be so promptly honored.

A HEARTY RECEPTION.

Admiral Douglas of the British warships visiting St. John and his fellow officers must be pleased with the hearty reception accorded them in the city of the Loyalists. At the Governor's dinner Saturday evening, the visitors were very cordially welcomed on behalf of the province by His Honor and Premier Tweedie, and by the mayor of St. John in felicitous speech. Particular mention was made of the fact that Admiral Douglas is a Canadian, and the Admiral in his reply said he never forgot the fact but was proud of it. Capt. de Horsey, of H. M. S. Tribune, in his reply, said he had been fighting niggers and mosquitoes while maintaining the blockade of Venezuela, and was glad to be back to the white man's country. The round of

pleasant events planned for the entertainment of Admiral Douglas and his staff will keep them busy while in St. John, and will impress them with the proverbial hospitality of that city.

The pity is that the authorities did not give the Admiral and his associates a trip up the beautiful St. John river to Fredericton, and they would have seen what a real white man's country is like.

Senator Ellis is the only one connected with the St. John press who appears to have been invited to the dinner given in St. John by Governor Snowball in honor of Admiral Douglas, and the Senator's bid was probably due to his representative political position. Were none of the journalists of the sister city considered of sufficient importance to rub clothes with the distinguished visitors and the St. John military nob who pushed their legs under the governor's mahogany at the Union Club Saturday evening? However there is to be some compensation to the press. The Admiral has promised to go fishing with Mr. Harry Thorne, who, although not an active journalist, has a good many dollars in the Sun.

The victory of the American riflemen at Bisley by which they captured the Palma trophy defeating half a dozen other teams, was exclusively reported in the Herald Saturday. The scores of the leading teams were: United States, 1570; United Kingdom, 1555; Canada, 1518. Last year the winners were the British team, in 1901 the Canadians won the trophy at Sea Girt, N. J., and now the trophy comes back to the Americans.

Fredericton is not honored by a visit from the British war ships, probably on account of the Oromocto shoals, but the absence of the admiral and his fleet will in a measure be compensated by the visit of Commodore Thompson and the yachts of the R. K. Club, which are due here this evening. These fresh water sailors from the mercantile offices, lawyers' dens, and other institutions of the sister city, will be very cordially welcomed.

At the dinner to the visiting United States naval officers in London, Lord Beresford, who presided, was happy as a phrase maker. He declared, having in view the King's efforts to establish and continue a cordial feeling between Great Britain and the Great Powers, His Majesty would be known as "Edward the Peacemaker."

Dominion Steel Company magnates visiting their industries in Cape Breton, spent Sunday by travelling to Louisbourg in a special train on business and pleasure. It was a bad example for Senator Cox of Toronto and his associates to set for other more humble people.

Mr. Chas. Devlin, the Canadian ex-M. P., who about a year ago was elected to the Imperial Parliament in Galway, is making rapid progress in the councils of the Irish national party. He has just been elected secretary of the United Irish Land League.

News from the Pope's sick bed is more assuring, and His Holiness may yet shake off insidious disease which has brought him so close to death's door. The vitality of the aged Pontiff is as remarkable as his great intellect and successful career.

If Hon. Geo. E. Foster could secure the job of the iceman, who in the discharge of his duties of cooling the House of Commons chamber at Ottawa fell through the glass roof, he might yet get into parliament.

It is stated that Mr. Neilson, who has resigned the superintendency of the St. John street railway to accept a position in Mexico, is to receive a salary of \$10,000.

The Dunn pork packing factory, burned in the Musquasa fire, is to be rebuilt at Fairville.
