

NOT SO WELL.

His Holiness, the Pope,
Apparently Sinking.AFFECTED WITH DIZZI-
NESS AND HALLUCIN-
ATIONS.And Not Permitted to Sit
Up Today.

(Special to Daily Herald.)

Rome, July 13.—At 9.15 this morning, the doctors issued the following bulletin, regarding the condition of the Pope: "Up to midnight the Pontiff remained tranquil, but afterwards he experienced agitated intervals. An examination of the thorax shows no change since the day before yesterday. The action of the kidneys continues slight, and the general condition of his holiness is somewhat depressed. His pulse is 82, respiration 32 and temperature 36 centigrade.

"At 12.29 his holiness became affected with dizziness accompanied by fleeting hallucinations. He was not allowed to get up today."

Sunday Night's Despatches.

Rome, July 12.—Pope Leo has lived to see another Sunday and with Sabbath quiet which fell upon Rome came also peace and even progress to the pontiff. Beginning this morning with distinct signs of improvement he maintained this throughout the day. Tonight Dr. Laponi made the following important statement in answer to the question if he believed that the improvement in the Pope's condition would continue:

"I believe that if the improvement lasts until July 21 we may not perhaps achieve an absolute cure, but we will secure such a general state of health in the patient as will allay our anxiety."

During the morning the pontiff participated in the celebration of mass. The ceremony was held in the chapel adjoining the sick chamber, Monsignor Marzoni being the celebrant. The door connecting the sick room with the chapel was opened so that His Holiness might follow the service.

The history of the day has been comparatively uneventful. The pontiff had several hours repose, Dr. Laponi resting near him throughout the night. The physician twice administered injections to him, once of digitalis to strengthen the heart and another injection of camphor-caffeine to overcome the patient's growing depression. This morning found the pontiff with spirits bright and conditions generally improved. Dr. Marzoni joined his associate at 8.30 and after a brief conference issued the most encouraging official bulletin thus far given. Besides summarizing the satisfactory pathological conditions, the doctor gave the cheering tidings that the pontiff's condition had manifestly improved. The pulse which went down yesterday to 82, had risen to 86, while the temperature and respiration showed no abnormal characteristics.

Pope Leo took his usual light breakfast and during the afternoon felt strong enough to get up. He arose, dressed himself alone in white, and went to sit in his usual armchair, where he remained for some time. Then the windows were opened for a change of air and the sun streamed in, together with a light refreshing breeze from the Mediterranean. Late in the afternoon he received Cardinals Mathieu, Steinhuber, Agliardi and Casali.

Later the pontiff took a short nap and slept tranquilly, although he seemed to have somewhat more difficulty in breathing. The doctors returned at 7.30 p. m. and their usual bulletin gave negative encouragement, simply showing that the favorable conditions of this morning had been maintained.

Rome, July 13, 6.45 a. m.—The condition of the Pope was stationary during the night. He slept at intervals, but was not entirely tranquil.

BABY STRANGLED.

Negroes Sold in Kansas.

Topeka, Kan., July 11.—A great deal of excitement has been caused throughout Kansas by the sale in Russell on the auction block today of ten negroes, who accepted the bids made for their services by the wheat-growers and bound themselves to obey the orders of their purchasers for thirty days. The negroes were all big, strong men, and some, who had worked in the Russell county fields last year brought the high price of \$6 a day for their services. The lowest price was \$3.25 a day, and only one negro accepted that. The sale was conducted by a regular auctioneer, and was not dissimilar in many features to the sale of slaves in the southern States before the war.

Last night at Bison, in Ness county, thirty farmers, using a lantern covered with red cloth, stopped a passenger train and took off fifty harvest hands consigned to counties further west.

A Fine Trip.

It is expected that about thirty persons from this city will patronize the A. O. H. excursion to historic old Quebec and the famous shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, which starts from this city by the C. P. R. tomorrow afternoon. Moose at Springhill.

Thomas Phillips, the well known shad fisherman saw a large moose on Hart's Island near Springhill on Saturday. The animal after roaming about the island for a time, swam to the Douglas shore and took to the woods.

Rev. Dr. Read's Funeral.

St. Stephen, July 13.—Funeral services over the remains of the late Dr. Read will be held in the Methodist church here tomorrow afternoon at four o'clock. The remains will leave here by C. P. R. on Wednesday morning for Moncton, where the burial will take place. Two sons of the deceased, Lee Read and J. Walter Read, arrived on Saturday night from Moncton and Marysville; one son arrived today from Chicago, and the other son will reach here tomorrow from Minneapolis. The non-arrival of the sons caused the delay in the burial.

FINALLY PASSED UPON.

Grand Trunk Pacific Scheme Before the Government.

Ottawa, July 13.—There was a meeting of the cabinet Saturday, when the Grand Trunk Pacific project was finally passed upon, and it is expected that an announcement of the government's policy will be made in the house early this week.

While there have been some minor changes in the agreement between the government and the company since the details of the undertaking were given in this correspondence, they are not of a material character.

Whatever alterations have been made they are in favor of the government. As there have been some criticisms of the best mode of dealing with the eastern section—that is from Moncton to Quebec—it is said that there is no change in this regard and that the decision remains to have a government-constructed road from Moncton to Winnipeg. As the name of Sir Rivers-Wilson and others connected with the Grand Trunk Railway Company, have been added to the directorate, it may be inferred that the company is taking a still greater interest in the scheme.

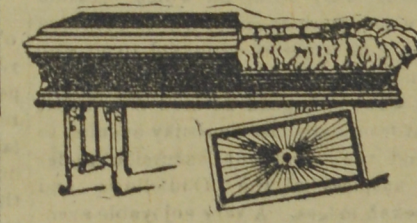
