New York, July 11.—Thirty-six deaths and 83 prostrations in Greater New York tell the story of yesterday's heat. It was the hottest July 10 in the history of the local weather bureau, the highest previous record being 91 degrees, recorded July 10, 1880.

Thursday's record of 94 degrees at 4 o'clock, the high weather mark of the year, was reached yesterday at 20 minutes past one o'clock, without signs of relief. But by two o'clock the temperature had fallen two degrees, where it remained during the next two hours. Fortunately the humidity was only 46 per cent. when the temperature stood at 94 and yielded slowly as the heat subsided towards night.

Montreal, July 11.—The Star's London cable says:—Andrew Carnegie has been compelled by the editor of the Ironmonger to admit that the Ironmonger interview belittling Canada was quite accurate. Carnegie's recent disavowal in Canadian papers referred to quite another interview, therefore Carnegie still stands as declaring Canada has no future, except as part of the United States, that Cape Breton is a mere mirage, and the Canadian steel industry a figment; that Canada standing alone can never become a greater industrial nation, and that the empire is only a catchword for politicians.

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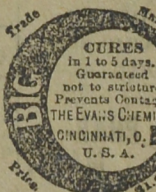
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
