AGAIN A WINNER.

Machum's Phantom Easily Captured Saturday's Yacht Race.

The second yacht race for the Morrison cup was sailed on Saturday afternoon when Charles Machum's Phantom once more demonstrated her superiority. Three boats started in the race, and the Asthore finished second and the Doreen third. The course was exactly the same as last week, the boats starting and finishing at a point in front of the B. and B. club house. The weather was fine and warm and a stiff northwest breeze prevailed. The boats got over the line well together at the sound of the gun, and kept pretty well bunched until after the first tack opposite Henry Chestnut's residence, when the Phantom took the lead, maintaining it until the finish. She was well handled by Skipper Atherton and his crew during the long beat to windward, and secured a good lead on her competitors. She had over a quarter of a mile to the good when the finish line was reached. The elapsed time of the three boats has been officially given out as follows:

Local Orangemen Celebrated the Day by Attending Divine Service in a Body.

Local Orangemen celebrated the anniversary of the battle of the Boyne by attending divine service at the Gibson Baptist church yesterday afternoon. The parade, which was organized at the Orange Hall, Gibson, at 2.30 o'clock, was made up of representatives of Rossmore Lodge of Gibson, Pickard Lodge of Marysville, Walker, Graham and Equal Rights lodges of this city, besides members of the Royal Black Knights of Ireland and Royal Scarlet Chapter. There were upwards of one hundred members of the order in line, all in full regalia. Considering the exceedingly hot weather which prevailed, the turnout was a most creditable one.

Rev. W. R. Robinson pastor of the Gibson Baptist church, was the preacher, and delivered a very able and interesting discourse in which he dealt fully with the aims and principles of Orangeism. His remarks commanded the rapt attention of all present.

Brief but pointed addresses were also delivered by Past Grand Master, A. D. Thomas and Deputy Grand Master H. F. McLeod.

At the close of the services the parade returned to the hall and disbanded. County Master George L. Haviland performed the duties of grand directors of ceremonies in an efficient manner.

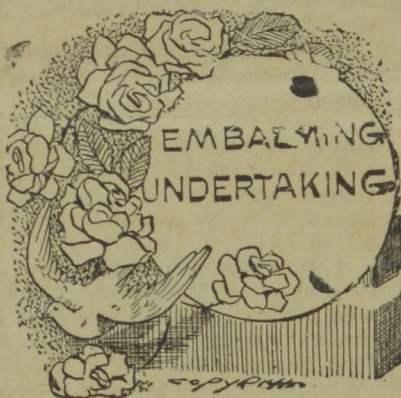
