

BIG GAME NOTES

Moose Head Measuring 67 in., Breaks all N. B. Records.

GAME LICENSE RETURNS THIS YEAR

Largest in History of the Province.

Emack Bros., the enterprising taxidermists, received a letter yesterday from a Miramichi man informing them that he had recently shot a moose on the Southwest Miramichi, with an antler spread of 67 inches. The lucky sportsman intimated that he was willing to sell the head for a certain figure, and Emack Bros. promptly replied accepting his offer. The letter also stated that the antlers had been measured by reliable persons and positively measured 67 inches and have 13 inch blades. The largest moose head previously taken in New Brunswick was secured on the Tobique some years ago by Mr. Stephen Decanter of New Hampshire. The antlers had a spread of 66 inches or one inch less than the moose reported to have lately been shot on the Miramichi, so the latter is undoubtedly the record head of New Brunswick.

One of the largest and best mooseheads seen in Fredericton this season was received at Emack's establishment yesterday from Mr. Charles D. Butler of Pittsfield, Mass. Mr. Butler secured the head several weeks ago on the Duganvorn where he hunted under the guidance of Daniel Munro, and so pleased was he that he took it all the way home in its raw state merely for the sake of showing it to his friends. The antlers, which are very symmetrical and perfectly matched, have a spread of 62½ inches, and each carried 14 points. Several American taxidermists endeavored to get hold of the head to set it up, but Mr. Butler was determined that Emack Bros. should have it, so sent it back to them.

Messrs. J. E. Smith and Murray Brewer of St. Marys, returned home last evening from a pleasant hunting trip on Cain's River. They did not have the good fortune to shoot a moose but each secured a nice caribou, and are naturally very proud of their success.

The big game season closes on Monday, November 30th, and those who intend to shoot a moose, caribou or deer this year will need to get a move on, as the time is getting short. The season has been by long odds the most successful in the province. Deputy Surveyor General Flewelling says that the returns from the game wardens and others who sell licenses are about all in, and the total receipts are certainly in excess of \$16,000. Last year the amount derived from this source was \$14,000, and the season did not terminate until December 31st. It is estimated that about five hundred non resident sportsmen took out licenses in this province at \$30 each during the season, and very few were unsuccessful in procuring game.

Messrs. H. F. McLeod and Louis M. Owens returned last evening from a week's hunting trip to the headwaters of the Kewick after caribou. They saw lots of moose and caribou signs, but the weather conditions were not favorable for successful hunting and they secured no game.

A BIG HUNTER.

Adam Moore Has Had a Most Successful Season on the Tobique.

Mr. Adam Moore, the stalwart hunter and guide of Scotch Lake, was among the visitors to the city today. Mr. Moore only recently returned from his hunting grounds in the Tobique region, after closing the most successful season in all his experience. He and his two sons and nephew handled twelve sportsmen altogether, and as usual they were very successful and returned home delighted not only with the country, but with the careful attention and kind treatment received at Moore's hands. Mr. Moore makes a great business of hunting, and the high reputation he enjoys as a guide, makes it an easy task for him to get all the parties he can handle. His staff during the present season just ended, consisted of his two sons, his nephew and Mr. Moore, who had charge of the culinary department. The latter made

the four days journey into camp without difficulty, and seemed to enjoy "roughing" it with her husband and sons. Adam had intended employing a man cook, but unable to find one to fill the bill, even at the high figure of \$2 per day, he extended the offer to his better half and was cheerfully accepted. She performed the duties in such a satisfactory manner that Adam has already engaged her services for next season at an increased remuneration.

Mr. Moore says that the influx of American sportsmen to the Tobique during the past season has been the largest in the history of that section, and a great many fine moose and caribou heads have been taken. He says there is no fear of big game diminishing in numbers on the Tobique so long as the game laws are properly enforced.

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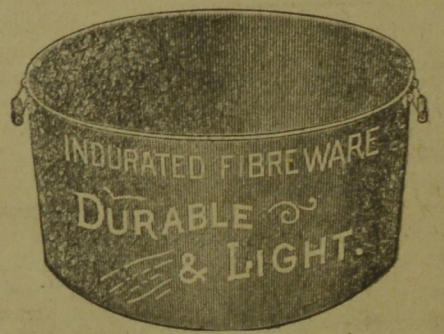
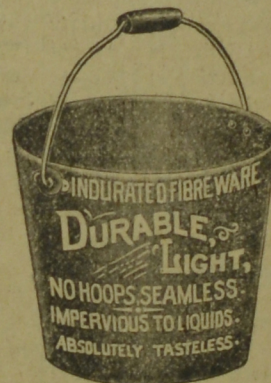
