Richards ably led the affirmative team which was made of seven men representing the Senior and Freshmen classes, while the negative team, chosen from the Junior and Sophomore classes, was captained by Clarence Santom. After the subject had been ably discussed pro and con, the chairman, Dr. Riley, announced that the affirmative side had won by three points.

Making Improvements.

AROUND THE MARKET.

A Large Variety of Country Produce and Good Prices.

Business was quite brisk in the market this morning, considering the state of the weather, and a great deal of farm produce changed hands. The number of teams was smaller than usual, the falling off being probably due to the unfavorable conditions for travel. Poultry was fairly plentiful, that is chickens and geese, but turkeys could not be had for love or money. There are lots of turkeys raised in this locality, but it is a little early yet for them to be taken to the block. They are being fattened for the Christmas trade, and there will probably be lots of them offered for sale during the next few weeks.

Nice plump geese were quite plentiful and were offered at 80 cents each. The best ones sold at this figure and the poorer grades went as low as 70 cents. Chickens sold all the way from 40 to 60 cents per pair, according to quality.

There is a great scarcity of eggs in the market just now and high prices prevail. One man asked 30 cents per dozen in the market this morning, but was content in the end to sell out for 26. Another man disposed of ten dozen at 25 cents.

Pork was fairly plentiful and sold by the carcass for 6 cents per pound. A small quantity was disposed of by the quarter for 7 cents. Beef was also quite plentiful and sold for 4, 5 and 6 cents per pound.

Potatoes, turnips, carrots and other vegetables were plentiful as usual, and brought about the average price.

Butter in prints was quite plentiful and apparently of good quality. The price ranged from 20 to 22 cents per pound.

COLLEGE RESIDENCE.

A Reply to the Herald's Article Urging Abolition.

CLAIM THAT UNDER DIFFERENT CONDITIONS

The System Would Even be a Financial Success.

To the Editor of the Herald.

Dear Sir,—Your issue of Nov. 26th contained an editorial concerning the residence of the University of New Brunswick. To one unacquainted with the facts your arguments for abolishing it might seem conclusive.

Your first reason is that residence has not proved popular or successful, because only 11 out of 106 male students have taken advantage of it. If your interest had been sufficient to lead you to inquire into the facts, you would have found that during the last two years every available room in residence has been occupied. No doubt you remember that when residence was restored in 1897, twelve rooms were thrown open for the use of students, 4 of which were on the lower flat and eight on the upper. This comprised the entire northern wing of the college building. Later, a professor was permitted to use one of these rooms, the students having no objections and several rooms being unoccupied at that time. At present the entire lower flat has been appropriated by the same professor and one room upstairs has been converted into a bathroom. So, Mr. Editor, you see that the residence is entirely filled, there being but seven rooms and the occupants of three preferring to remain alone.

Now if the lower flat were open to students as formerly, and by the way there are several desirous of entering, there would be an additional revenue varying in amount from \$400 to over \$750. With this it would be quite possible to run residence at a yearly gain of \$100 or \$150. This would undermine your other argument for abolishing residence, viz., that there is now an annual loss of \$200.

The present occupant of the lower flat values his exemptions from payment of rent and heating at \$200, which is given as part of his salary. This is the reason of residence's annual loss. He has put himself on record to the effect that if half of this sum were added in cash to his present salary he would gladly move down town. At Acadia, the residency, which is entirely given up to the use of students, is a complete success and a source of revenue to the college. The rates at our own University are considerably higher than those prevailing there, and it should be possible to make up the \$100 out of the receipts from residence.

We have not discussed the benefits derived from a residence, which are many and well known, but have confined ourselves to the business management of it, as was done in your editorial.

Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for your valuable space, we feel that it would not be right to encroach at greater length upon your kindness.

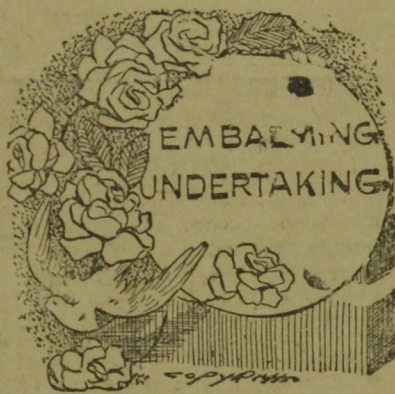
