

A LIBERAL GRANT. SCATHING REBUKE.

City Council Will Aid Exhibition to

EXTENT OF \$2,500.

The Full Amount Asked for By a Delegation

FROM THE FREDERICTON AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

A delegation from the Fredericton Agricultural Society, waited upon the city council last evening and strongly urged that a grant of \$2500 be placed in the present year's assessment in aid of the Maritime exhibition to be held in the city in September next. Those composing the delegation were:

President A. Campbell, M.P.P., C. Fred Chestnut, William McKay, R. W. McLellan, J. D. McKay, M. Teonan, W. S. Hooper, D. Lee Babbitt, A. D. Thomas, George Y. Dibblee and F. S. Hilyard.

R. W. McLellan, solicitor of the Society, who was chief spokesman, referred to a previous occasion a few months ago, when the representatives waited upon the council and asked for a grant of \$2500. It was with the same object that he and those with him appeared before the council tonight. He spoke of the great success of the last exhibition, and thought if the Society's plans were carried out, the Maritime exhibition to be held next September, would be a greater success than the last one. It had been found that increased building accommodation was necessary, and already tenders for a new building had been called for. Representatives of the society had lately waited upon the government and asked for a grant to aid the exhibition, and had assurances that liberal assistance would be forthcoming. In conclusion he stated that the society had figured on obtaining \$2,500 from the city, and needed every dollar of that amount, and he hoped the council would see its way clear to grant it.

President Campbell said that there was very little that he could add to what had been said by the solicitor. As everybody knew, it required money to conduct an exhibition, and he felt that he could assure the council that if a grant was made as asked for the money would be judiciously expended. During the last exhibition the society had been somewhat cramped for room, and had found increased building accommodation an absolute necessity. Since the last exhibition an additional lot of land had been purchased and a cottage had been erected for the caretaker, which meant quite a heavy outlay. He trusted that the council would see its way clear to grant the amount asked for, and was sure it would be very acceptable to the society.

Mr. Dibblee pointed out that an exhibition would bring a very large number of strangers to the city. They expected twenty thousand altogether during exhibition week, and if they expended \$2 each it would mean \$40,000 to the city. He considered that a pretty good return for the outlay. Mr. Dibblee pointed out in conclusion that the members of the society, with the exception of the secretary performed their duties gratuitously, and had no other interest than the advancement of the city.

Short addresses were also made by Messrs. Tennant, Hilyard, Chestnut, J. D. McKay, Hooper and McCatherine, after which the delegation withdrew.

It may be added here, that the council after giving the matter careful consideration, decided to accede to the wishes of the Society. The sum of \$2500 was voted, one half the amount to be assessed during the present year, and the remainder in 1904. Authority to make the assessment will be obtained from the legislature during the present session.

The vote of the council on the question of making a grant to the exhibition was unanimous.

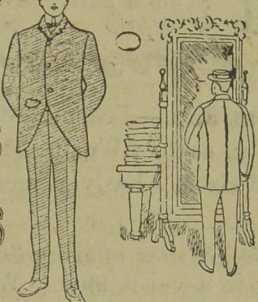

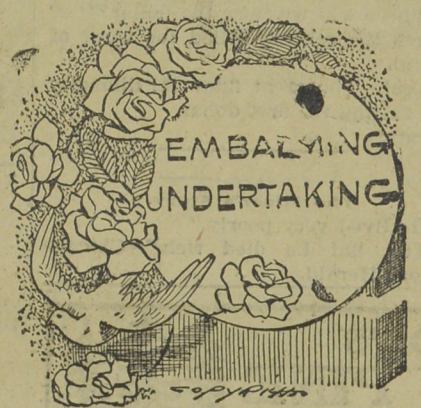
