STILL ON STRIKE.

Montreal, Feb. 7.—The street railway is tied up as tight as ever, not a single car is moving today, and there is little prospect of any leaving the barns.

Last night the strikers flooded the car tracks from Craig street near the central barn of the company, so that today they are covered with ice and it would be impossible for cars to come out till it has been cut away.

Thousands of people have walked to work. The weather continues fine and no serious disturbance has yet occurred.

BLAKE COMING BACK.

Toronto, Feb. 7.—It is rumored that the return of Hon. Edward Blake into the Canadian political arena is a possibility in the near future. It is on good authority, although Mr. Blake's plans are not yet known except to his immediate friends. To one of these Mr. Blake, before he left Canada to return to England for the opening of the Imperial House, is reported to have said that he was going back to put his political affairs across the ocean in order, after which he intended to return to Canada and re-enter public life.

FORMER PROVINCIAL ELECTIONS.

It is Nearly Four Years Since the Opposition Received Their Last Drubbing.

The last general provincial election took place on Feb. 18, 1899, and the opposition succeeded in electing only five supporters in a house of forty-six. Hazen, Glasier, Shaw, Humphrey, and Melanson were the only survivors of Dr. Stockton's brigade.

The government has undergone some changes since that date. Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Hon. A. S. White and Hon. A. D. Richard went out, and Hon. Wm. Pageley, Hon. G. F. Hill and Hon. H. A. McKeown came in. Hon. L. J. Tweedie, on Sept. 1st, 1900, became premier in succession to Mr. Emmerson.

At the last general election there was a contest in every constituency except Gloucester, where the three candidates were chosen by acclamation. In Northumberland there were only five candidates for the four seats.
