VERY EXCITING RUNAWAY.

Dr. McNally's Horse Made Things Lively on Queen Street—a Brave Act.

Dr. G. J. McNally's horse, with sleigh attached, made things exceedingly lively on Queen street about four o'clock yesterday afternoon. It started on court house square, and after throwing out the driver, George Thompson, dashed across Queen street, and thence up town on the sidewalk. There were a large number of pedestrians between Regent and Carleton streets, who were scattered right and left by the runaway, and several persons narrowly escaped being knocked down by it. The animal ran as far as Carleton street corner where a capture was effected. The sleigh was seriously damaged.

When the runaway started up street, Mrs. D. E. Crowe was standing in front of the store of Shute & Co., conversing with a lady friend, at the outer edge of the sidewalk. A baby sleigh containing her two children had been left by her just across the sidewalk in front of one of the windows. The runaway came upon her so suddenly that she did not have time to reach the children, and they would certainly have been trampled to death, but for the presence of mind and bravery of a gentleman who chanced to be passing at the time. Regardless of his own peril, he caught the children and just had time to toss them into the doorway and spring to one side himself, when the horse and sleigh went tearing past. Those who were near by and witnessed this brave act did not recognize the gentleman and he left without disclosing his identity.
