CANADA'S PROSPERITY.

Even the clergymen when they have opportunity, are constrained to speak publicly of the great prosperity Canada has enjoyed since the advent of Liberal government.

At the inauguration of Rev. Dr. Magill as a professor in the Presbyterian Theological college at Halifax, Wednesday evening, Rev. Dr. Pollok, principal of that institution, in welcoming the new professor, observed:

"You have come to a very fine country, a very beautiful country, and more attractive than any other under the jurisdiction of the church. We live in a country where there are no great disasters; we have scenes of great beauty, we are socially happy, and there is great amity and friendship between one another. It is one of the happiest countries in the world, and householders do not even find it necessary to lock their doors."

Canada, Dr Pollok declared, was prosperous, and the trade of the country had doubled in the past five years. The great West was a marvellous country, growing rapidly, and people were flocking there in thousands, and there was material prosperity everywhere.

The Liberals do not claim to have made Canada or have produced its great beauty of which Dr. Pollock spoke so enthusiastically. The Creator did that, and did it well, but a large measure of this country's present prosperity is due to the energetic policy of the Liberal government. The wonderful increase in trade, the enormous influx of settlers in the Northwest, and the general content and prosperity of the people are largely traceable to the Liberal policy. There was no such awakening, such marvellous development under Conservative rule. The clergymen, intelligent men as they are, recognize this, and the bulk of them we believe, if not outspoken Liberals, are in sympathy with the Liberal policy and administration. They are in close touch with the people and have full knowledge of the conditions.

There is another reason why the men who direct the spiritual affairs of the country are sympathetic with Liberals, and opposed to Toryism. As right thinking men with strong religious convictions, they recognize that under Sir Wilfrid Laurier the country enjoys clean and honest government. There are no McGreevys or Langevins or Gameys in the Liberal party councils: there are no political scandals "smelling to heaven," as there were in the days of Toryism, no revelations such as those of 1891 which made the people of Canada hang their heads in shame.

TOMORROW'S ANNIVERSARY.

It will be three years tomorrow since the general federal election, when the Liberal government won such a signal triumph at the polls, carrying every province in Canada except Ontario. The past three years have been stirring ones in the history of Canada, and in all its aspirations the country has had the active cooperation of the Laurier cabinet.

There must necessarily be another appeal to the country in a short time, and there is no doubt of the government's ability to secure a third endorsement from the electors of Canada. The Conservative party has not profited by its period of opposition, and is as much disorganized as when the votes were counted in 1896, and it was found that the Tory rulers of eighteen years were dismissed from office. The old leaders who were prominent for their ability and tact, have disappeared, and are replaced

by men of much smaller calibre, commonplace men, who in comparison with the Liberal chiefs are political pigmies. The party is without a policy except that of obstruction and the desire to regain office. From every province comes news of Liberal strength and popularity and Tory disunion and weakness. The Liberals from the Atlantic to the Pacific have no fear of an appeal to the people, let it come when it may.

HIS OBJECT CLEAR.

Some complications in the political situation in Cumberland, N. S., are probable, if Mr. Amos Purdy, who was dismissed from the Amherst postmastership is sincere in his declaration that he will contest the county for the House of Commons as an independent Liberal. Mr. Purdy, who is seventy eight years old, and represented his county in the House of Assembly from 1867 to 1871, feels very sore over his dismissal, and desires to get square with Mr. Logan, M.P. Or perhaps it would be correct to say that Mr. Purdy, while not having any hope of securing his own election, desires the success of Mr. Rogers, the Tory candidate, who is Mr. Purdy's son-in-law. Probably Mr. Purdy anticipates that his candidature will take sufficient Liberal votes from Mr. Logan to ensure Mr. Rogers' election, but it is not likely that the Liberals of Cumberland will be green enough to be caught in that way.

Mr. Logan, who has twice carried Cumberland for the Liberals, defeating in 1896 the late Hon. Arthur Dickey, minister of justice in the Tupper government, has proved himself an energetic and successful representative; he stands high in the Liberal party, and his friends in Cumberland will doubtless see to it that he is again returned to Parliament.

The Local Government, carrying out the announcement of Premier Tweedie at the last session of the legislature, have decided to increase the rate of stumpage on spruce and pine from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per thousand, and in proportion upon other lumber. The buoyant condition of the lumber market justifies the increase, which will add quite a large sum to the provincial revenue.

There is a rumor that on the King's birthday, next Monday, His Majesty will confer knighthood on Hon. Geo. A. Drummond, vice president of the Bank of Montreal, and on Senator Cox, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

It will be embarrassing for Mr. Foster if some enquiring Englishman asks the ex-finance minister why he is not in political business in Canada. Suppose they know anything about St. John and North Ontario?

It is announced that the Dominion Coal Co., operating in Cape Breton, are about to open three more mines, and that as a result their output of coal will be increased forty per cent.

Mr. Chamberlain has sent Mr. Foster to stump among the Welshmen, but when he realizes the power of our distinguished fellow countrymen he will exhibit Mr. Foster in the biggest cities of the Kingdom.

Mr. Foster is creating a good impression in England. He has made two speeches for Mr. Chamberlain, and his style of oratory has taken with his audiences.

If it were not for the probability of inciting war with the United States, Mr. Chamberlain might call on Mr. Gourley to take hand in the fiscal campaign.

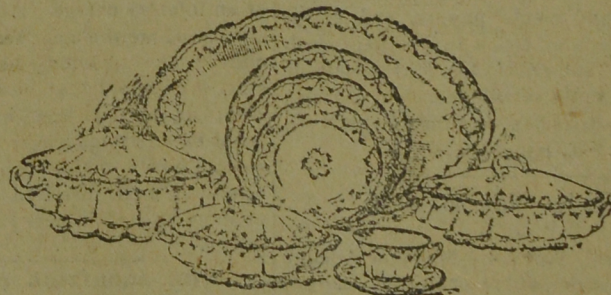
