SHOULD BE REVISED.

Paris, Nov. 6.—The Presse to day says that the Minister of War, General Andre, as a result of the inquiry which has made into the Dreyfus affair, has informed the Cabinet that in his opinion the sentence of the Rennes court-martial (at which Dreyfus was convicted and sentenced to Devil's Island) should be revised. The War Minister is also said to have asked for the views of his colleagues on the subject, but they were unable to come to an agreement.

GONE WITH CASH.

Winnipeg, Nov. 6.—A Brandon despatch says an employe of the C. P. R. freight sheds, Reginald Helliwell, aged fifteen, has disappeared with about \$85 in cash. He was entrusted with \$4,000 to send by express to Winnipeg on Monday night, but failing to return to the office next day, inquiries elicited the fact he had vanished. Upon his trunk being searched \$4,000 was discovered in cheques and cash. There is no clue to his whereabouts.

HELD FOR RANSOM.

Brigands Want \$100,000 for Return of Young Wentz.

Bristol, Tenn., Nov. 7.—Edward L. Wentz, the young Philadelphia millionaire who disappeared Oct. 12, from his home in Virginia has been heard from. He is a prisoner in the mountains, and is held for \$100,000 ransom.

Negotiations are on, and it is believed that his father will pay the amount to effect his release.

A LIVELY RIOT.

Lyons, France, Nov. 6.—Immediately after a meeting held here protesting against the system of employment agencies and alleged brutality of the police in Paris, a riot occurred. Many of the police were seriously injured and several arrests were made.

A WATER FAMINE.

Sterbrooke, Quebec, Nov. 6.—The low state of the Magog River is becoming very serious, and unless rain comes soon it is hard to determine what the outcome will be. The Paton Manufacturing Co. was obliged to close its works yesterday owing to lack of

water. Only a portion of the works had been running, at that, and on enquiry at the company's offices, it was stated that the mills were closed until there was more water in the river.

The Messrs. Lomas & Son, who have the prior claim on the river, to the extent of two sets, began yesterday to run that amount of machinery. The amount of water required to do this is barely sufficient to keep the pumps for the city's water supply and electric light company's plant going. The electric company has issued a notice that owing to the lack of water it will be obliged to close down the power and light supply from five to seven o'clock in the evenings.

COMING TO CANADA.

London, Nov. 6.—A large number of weavers, mostly young women from southeast Lancashire are emigrating to Canada. Women agents, acting on behalf of the mill owners of Valleyfield and other manufacturing localities in Canada, have been scouring Lancashire and Yorkshire in search of women weavers willing to emigrate to the Dominion. It is stated that passage money in some cases has been advanced.

WANT FUNDS.

London, Nov. 6.—The Tariff Reform League has made an appeal for funds, signed by Chamberlain and the Duke of Sutherland. The manifesto sets forth that the Cobden Club is supplied with £400,000 to pursue its campaign. The league hopes to find at least 100 sympathizers to contribute £1,000 in four equal annual sums of £250. Twenty subscribers have already given assent to these conditions.

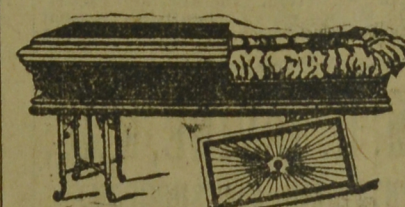
