

WON AGAIN.

St. Joseph's College Downed by the U. N. B.

GAME WAS PLAYED IN A POURING RAINSTORM

And the Boys From Mem- ramcook Were Shut Out.

U. N. B. 9—St. Joseph's 0.

The football match on the college athletic field yesterday afternoon between teams representing St. Joseph's College and the U. N. B. resulted in a crushing defeat for the boys from Memramcook. The game was played in a heavy downpour of rain which made it decidedly unpleasant for both spectators and players, particularly the latter. The ground was in a fearful condition, large pools of muddy water having formed in many places, but the players did not seem to mind this in the least. An occasional fallow in the mire failed to dampen their enthusiasm, but was rather tough on their uniforms, and khaki seemed to be the fashionable color at the close of the game.

The game was not quite as exciting as U. N. B. Mount Allison game of last week, but it was a very good exhibition, and the spectators seemed to enjoy it. The U. N. B. team, though weakened by the absence of several of the best players, had things pretty nearly all their own way from the start, and the result of the match was never in doubt. The St. Joseph's boys put up a good fight against odds, and their combination work and clever passing elicited much favorable comment. They lost the game simply because they were up against a better team.

St. Joseph's kicked off, but the ball was soon returned, and remained in the visitors' territory most of the time during the first half. At the end of fifteen minutes play St. Joseph's was compelled to touch for safety. The Varsity boys soon returned the ball from centre field, and managed to work it up to St. Joseph's five yard line, where a scrimmage ensued. While the struggle was still on Goodspeed captured the ball and by clever dodging managed to get it over the line for a try. Dunphy undertook to convert it into a goal, but fell short by a few feet. After the kick out the ball remained for a short time in the centre of the field, and St. Joseph's won a free kick out of a scrimmage. They managed for once to get the ball into U. N. B. territory, where a series of scrimmages took place. Finnemore got the ball for the college and made a pretty run with it, but was tackled and downed just as he reached the line. Soon afterwards Malcolm got the ball out of a scrimmage and passed it to Fraser who came within an ace of scoring. In the five yard scrimmage which followed St. Joseph's was compelled to touch for safety. When half time was called the score stood, U. N. B., 3; St. Joseph's, 0.

THE SECOND HALF.

Barker kicked off for the U. N. B. in the second half and sent the ball within a few feet of Memramcook goal. The attempt to return it was not successful and the referee ordered a five yard scrimmage. St. Joseph's dribbled the pigskin back a few yards, but the U. N. B. boys were on the alert, and by clever strategy Finnemore succeeded in scoring a try. Dunphy made another trial for goal but with no better success than the first time. The ball was wet and soggy and simply refused to cross the bar. During the next few minutes of play, the ball was again carried over St. Joseph's line, but no score was made. The U. N. B. boys continued to force the play and did not allow the ball to get more than ten yards from the goal line of their opponents. It was finally grabbed out of a scrimmage, and passed to Goodspeed, who scored the third try for his team. Again Dunphy tried for a goal and missed. The remaining fifteen minutes of the play was quite lively, and the good defensive work of St. Joseph's prevented any further addition to the score. There were several five yard scrimmages in St. Joseph's territory and, once the ball was carried over the line, but no score was allowed. The game ended with a score of 9 to 0 in favor of the U. N. B.

For the U. N. B. capital work was done by Goodspeed, Malcolm, Fraser, Finnemore, Malloy and Dunphy. For St. Joseph's Landry put up a star game, and good work was also done by Dyeart, Lane and Gaudet.

PROPOSED CELEBRATION.

Ter-Centenary of St John River Discovery to be Observed.

Plans for such a celebration as has not often been enjoyed here have been suggested, says the St. John Telegraph, and will be considered at once, for the observance in June next of the ter-centenary of Champlain's discovery of the River St. John, June 24, 1604, was the day on which Champlain sailed into St. John harbor and for several days about June 24, 1904, there promises to be a grand celebration here.

Nova Scotia, too, is planning a big time at Halifax and Annapolis and people in Maine are interesting themselves to commemorate the anniversary of the discovery of the St. Croix river.

Last evening in the Natural History Society room, Market building, a committee from the Historical Society met with committees from the Loyalist and Natural History societies, discussed a grand programme, appointed a committee on finance and adjourned to meet again on Nov. 24 at 8.30 p. m.

Rev. Dr. Raymond, Dr. Matthew and Mr. Jack were appointed a committee to go to Halifax and interview those there who are arranging the Nova Scotia celebration, and also to communicate with those interested in Maine. A programme of suggestions for the celebration St. John was drawn up as follows:

Naval and military demonstration with British, United States and French war vessels.

The annual meeting of the Royal Society of Canada to be held here.

Opening of the new free public library, which will be finished by that time.

The presence here of the governor general, Canada's premier and other distinguished Canadians.

Co-operation with United States people who are arranging to celebrate the discovery of the St. Croix river; also with those arranging Halifax and Annapolis celebration.

An old home week for bringing in New Brunswickers from all parts of the world. Memorial services in the churches on the Sunday nearest to June 24.

Mild Form of Smallpox.

Dr. Fisher, secretary of the board of health, has been advised of an outbreak of smallpox in the county of Madawaska and has through the local health authorities taken thorough precaution to check the disease.

Twelve houses in the parishes of St. Leonard's and St. Ann's are under quarantine but the actual number of cases is not known here.

The disease, which is said to be of a mild type, is supposed to have been brought from across the border. The board of health has charge of the cases, and have engaged a physician to remain in the infected districts.

A St. Leonard's despatch says: There are eight cases of smallpox in town, and six are reported from the surrounding country. All of them are of a mild type. The board of health has all the suspected cases in hand, and the necessary precautions have been taken to prevent further spread of the disease.

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
