Fish Without Bait.

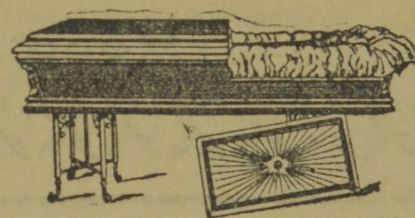
