

SUDDEN DEATH.

Miss Jane Leary Passed Away This Forenoon

AT THE RESIDENCE OF MR. R. C. MCCREDIE.

Well Known Marysville Man Dies from Consumption.

Miss Jane Leary, an elderly lady, who for the past ten years has made her home with Mr. and Mrs. R. C. McCredie, King street, expired very unexpectedly this forenoon. She had just finished eating her breakfast and had got up from the table to leave the dining room, when she was taken suddenly ill. As her condition was quite alarming a physician was called in, but when he reached the patient's side, she was beyond medical aid. He expressed the opinion that apoplexy was the cause of her demise.

The deceased lady was sixty-four years of age, and a native of Woodstock although this city has been her home for many years. She is survived by one brother, Mr. John Leary, a wealthy resident of Seattle, who supported her, and one sister, Mrs. Maggie Barker, of Philadelphia. The remains will be taken to Woodstock for interment, leaving here by the Gibson branch train tomorrow morning. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

W. A. McConaghy.

Mr. Wesley A. McConaghy, a well known resident of Marysville, died at his home at that place on Sunday morning after a lingering illness from consumption. The deceased only a few months ago returned from Washington state where he has resided for the past four years. About a year ago he was taken down with smallpox at Aberdeen, and shortly after recovering from the disease, contracted lagrippe, which developed into consumption, and necessitated his return home during the month of September. Mr. McConaghy was well known in this city, being at one time connected with an agricultural implement agency here. He was thirty-seven years of age, and leaves a widow and two children. He also leaves four brothers, James and Charles residing at Marysville, Edgar, of St. Marys, and Robert of Springfield, Mass. He was a member of Pickard Lodge, L. O. A., and the funeral will take place under the auspices of that organization on Wednesday at two o'clock. Undertaker George W. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

Montreal, Dec. 28. — Melville Church, the leading Presbyterian place of worship in Westmount, the fashionable residential suburb of Montreal, is without the service of a choir today. In his sermon on Christmas morning, Rev. T. W. Winfield, pastor of the church, severely criticized the members of the choir for eating candy during that portion of the service in which they did not take a leading part. As a result of the criticism a deputation from the choir waited on the reverend gentleman on Saturday and requested a retraction. This he refused to make, and as a result, the choir, without an exception, went out on a strike.

It must have been rather disconcerting to the declamatory speaker who, despising all technicalities, tried to storm his hearers by sheer force of eloquence, but who on uttering the words "in the book of nature it is written" was interrupted by a quiet looking gentleman with a mild request that he would "name the page." His lordship, who was an inveterate joker, possessed a readiness of repartee and a quaint sense of humor that often stood him in good stead. Once when canvassing Hampshire in conjunction with Sir George Staunton he held a meeting at a hotel which was but dimly lighted at each end by two small windows.

During the noble lord's speech he was frequently interrupted by cries of "No! No!" proceeding from a little fat man in one of the windows, who was butler to an old admiral in the neighborhood. There were loud calls to bring him forward, but Lord Palmerston promptly said: "Pray don't interfere with the gentleman. Let him remain in the window. Providence has denied him any intellectual light. It would be hard indeed to deprive him of the light of heaven!"—London Standard.
