

A FLYING VISIT.

Royal Kennebecasis Yacht
Fleet Arrived Here
Yesterday.

BOYS HAD AN ENJOYABLE
CRUISE UP THE RIVER.

Officers Had a Drive
About the City.

THE FLEET TOOK ITS DEPARTURE AT
3.30 P. M. TODAY.

The fleet of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht club, which left St. John Saturday afternoon on the annual river cruise, arrived here at five o'clock last evening, and dropped anchor just below the Bicycling and Boating club house. The steam yacht Scienda, the flagship of the fleet, towed nine of the yachts up from the lower mill, and the others came in under sail later on. The fleet left Swan Creek yesterday morning, and had a fair wind during most of the way up, and got on splendidly. When opposite the lower mill at four o'clock in the afternoon the wind died out, and the Scienda came to the rescue with her tow line.

Most of those composing the crews of the various yachts came on shore, immediately after the fleet had dropped anchor, and there was a stampede in the direction of barber shops and hotels. Although the trip up from St. John had been most enjoyable the boys seemed glad of an opportunity to get on shore and stretch their legs. They practically owned the town during the evening.

There are altogether twenty-two craft in the fleet, three being steam yachts and the remainder schooners and sloops. The beautiful steam yacht Scienda, the property of Robert Thompson, is the flagship of the fleet, and all orders have to be taken from her. When darkness came on last evening she was illuminated with colored lights and made a fine appearance. Among those on board of her in addition to Commodore Thomson were Attorney General Pugsley, R. T. Leavitt, Rear Commodore Arthur Adams, W. E. Stavert, Dr. Lindsey Parker (chaplain of the fleet), Frank Lovitt, and Dr. W. S. Cooling. During the evening an impromptu concert was held on board of the flagship, the program including selections by a quartette composed of Frank L. Cooper, R. A. March, W. D. Saunders and A. E. Massie.

The magnificent sailing yacht Columbia, which left St. John with the fleet was obliged to remain at Swan Creek, her draft of water being too great to make the run above that point. The Columbia is the property of Frank Lovitt, a wealthy Yarmouth gentleman, who spends the winters in California, and the summers cruising along the Atlantic seaboard. Only a few days ago he returned from a cruise to Long Island Sound, reaching St. John in time to join the fleet.

Another steam yacht in the fleet is the "Albatross," owned by Dr. Israel E. Lovitt, of Yarmouth. Dr. Lovitt is a cousin of Frank Lovitt, and like him is a gentleman of independent means. He visits Fredericton in his yacht almost every season.

A very large number of citizens of all ages visited the club house last evening to see the fleet, and assisted in giving the jolly yachtsmen a hearty welcome.

This morning the Queen Hotel barouches were placed at the disposal of Commodore Thomson and the Scienda's guests, and they enjoyed a drive about the city. His Worship Mayor Palmer paid his respects to the Commodore at ten o'clock on board the Scienda, and took part in the drive about the city.

There are a number of ladies on board the yachts and they seem to be enjoying the cruise fully as much as the gentlemen. There are many excellent singers among them and several selections rendered last evening while the fleet was lying at anchor, were greatly enjoyed by those who had the good fortune to be within hearing. Miss Dunn, a St. John lady, who is a guest on the yacht Gracie M., rendered several vocal solos in a most charming manner, and was very heartily applauded by the yachtsmen and spectators occupying seats on the piazza of the club house.

The fleet took its departure at three thirty this afternoon, a large crowd of visitors being on hand to see them off. At the discharge of the signal gun on the

flagship, sails were quickly hoisted and in a very short space of time, the yachts were moving towards the draw of the railway bridge. A stiff breeze was blowing from the south, and the boats had to back several times before they could make their way through the draw. By 3.30 o'clock all had moved out from the anchorage, the schooner yacht Windward being the last to leave.

The fleet will endeavor to make the run as far as Upper Gagetown this evening, and tomorrow will be spent on the Washademoak Lake where a series of races will be held.

On Sunday next the annual divine service of the R. K. Y. C. will be conducted at Oak Point by Rev. Lindsay Parker, the chaplain. After the service the fleet will disband.

Captain Lovitt and several members of the crew of the yacht Columbia will remain in the city over night and go down in the David Weston tomorrow morning to join their yacht, which was left at Swan Creek yesterday.

The flagship Scienda in making the turn near the centre of the river, opposite the Star Line wharf, became grounded, and up to 4.15 o'clock all efforts to float her had been unsuccessful. A small steam yacht went to the assistance of the flagship and endeavored to tow her off the bar but did not seem equal to the task.

She was towed off by the steam yacht Clymene at 4.20 o'clock and started down river after the fleet.

Wedded at Houlton.

Mr. Harry Finemore, late of this city, and Miss Teresa Lynch, of Petersville, Queens County, were united in marriage at Houlton on the 7th inst., Rev. Father McCarthy performing the ceremony. END IS NEAR.

Pope Face to Face
With Death

AND FULLY REALIZES
HIS CRITICAL
POSITION.

Has Only Brief Periods of
Consciousness.

(Special to the Daily Herald.)

Rome, July 14, 9.15 a. m.—The following bulletin has been issued by the physician in attendance on Pope Leo: "There has been no change in the grave condition of the Pope since last night. Pulse, 92, weak; respiration 30, temperature 36.5 centigrade."

His Holiness passed a very uncomfortable night. He had several attacks of vomiting, and lost consciousness.

"All hope was abandoned at 11 a. m. Before lapsing into delirium, his holiness fully realized the extreme gravity of his condition. He asked to see Cardinal Rampolla and whispered a brief message to him. He then asked to receive the benediction, which was performed by Tato."

Rome, July 14, 2.16 a. m.—"While there is life there is hope," was all the consolation that that Dr. Lapponi could give tonight in admitting that Pope Leo's condition was very grave.

The Pontiff has suffered another relapse and he lies this morning in a more critical condition than at any time since the middle of last week. The semi-comatose condition into which he fell at midnight and the confused state of his heretofore lucid mind on his awakening at an early hour this morning, accompanied by still greater depression than during yesterday, are regarded as symptoms of the gravest nature and as pointing to an imminent dissolution.

Even in the evening medical opinion was less pessimistic and Dr. Mazzoni thought the end was not within sight. He expressed the belief that unless the disease took an unexpected turn there was no reason to apprehend death for two or three days. This statement, however, did not relieve the anxiety of those who knew what powerful stimulants are being constantly administered.

Rome, July 14, 12.20 a. m.—Shortly before midnight the Pontiff fell into a state of unconsciousness half sleep, half coma. He is very restless. The heat of the body is high for the patient's organism and he appears to be feverish.

London, July 14—A despatch from Rome timed midnight says:—

The Pope is rapidly sinking. All his relatives have been summoned. It is reported that he has relapsed into unconsciousness.

Rome, July 14 2.16 a. m.—The Pope called out several times in his sleep and then awoke, showing great signs of depression and with his ideas somewhat confused.

Rome, July 14, 4.30 a. m.—Dr. Lapponi has succeeded in re-animating the Pope with stimulants. He also gave him a little nourishment. The patient's breathing is again difficult. He says he feels very tired.

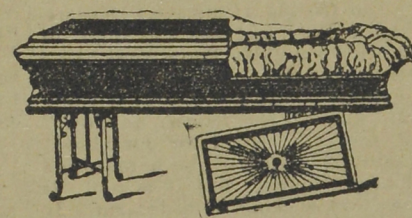
